GAVE THE SNAP AWAY.

Mr. Borden on his return from his political tour of the west, was lunched by a Tory club at Montreal Saturday, and in an address the Tory leader said that in New Brunswick there had long been a coalition, but it had become a Liberal government, and the Conservatives under Mr. Hazen had every hope of upsetting it. Mr. Hazen will have an account to settle with the Tory leader. The local opposition leader and his friends in the press have been declaring most strenuously that the local government has no claim on the Liberals because, as they allege, it is practically controlled by Conservatives. Mr. Hazen has indeed been beseeching Liberals to give no quarter to the government, and now Mr. Borden spoils the game by declaring that Mr. Hazen is heading a Conservative combination to overturn the local Liberal government.

Just as most people thought, but Mr. Borden has let the cat out of the bag. If Mr. Hazen could induce a sufficient number of Liberals to join him in overturning the government, the cry would go abroad that the Liberal party had been beaten in this province.

Mr. Borden should have been posted not to give the thing away at such an early stage in the game. It is very awkward for Mr. Hazen and the two or three Liberals who have announced their adhesion to Mr. Hazen's programme.

A SILLY DREAM.

Under the heading of "Our Greatest Duty," the Boston Evening Record keeps the following standing in prominent type at the head of its editorial column: "The thought of every public man, year in and year out, should be directed to this, our greatest national, economic, political and military safety, The Acquisition of Canada."

Some of our Canadian friends, resident in Boston are very indignant at the Record, and we have received several marked copies of the paper containing the offensive paragraph.

We advise our friends not to worry over the matter. The public men of the United States, all the other men in the republic and the women too and the children, may think until they are grey headed about the acquisition of Canada, and this country will go on prospering all the same, firm and true in its allegiance to Great Britain, and with a destiny that shall yet rival that of its powerful neighbor. There is no more thought of annexation in Canada than there is of uniting our fortunes with Russia, and the American newspaper that pretends to think there is any possibility of their country acquiring Canada, is wasting its intellect on a dream that can never be realized.

The King and Queen attended special service at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday, to give thanks for His Majesty's recovery. The scene at St. Paul's was more brilliant than devotional. All the officials present wore their uniforms and decorations, creating a blaze of color seldom seen in the cathedral. King Edward was dressed in the uniform of a field marshal and wore the decoration of the Order of the Garter. The King has apparently quite recovered his health.

Montreal Herald.—There is a rumour that Hon. George Foster will again butt into politics. Only this time Mr. Foster will take care not to run in a constituency against anyone who looks like Mr. Blair. No more of your snow storm, 1,000 vote minority frosts for the ex financial critic of the Opposition.

There is great industrial activity at Acadia Mines, Colchester Co., N. S., the former scene of an extensive iron ore smelting plant. The industry a few years ago languished and the town was practically deserted, but a new company, mostly of Montreal men, have purchased the property and are reviving the works. The company's capital is \$1,000,000 and employment will be given to 500 men.

Mr. Hazen has heard that things are not looking very bright for him in Sunbury, and so he came up and stirred the political pot at Ruisagornish Saturday night. Mr. Glasier was also there with the auditor general's report, which he has adopted as a family text book. Mr. Glasier is a great reader.

The Tory papers are boasting of the great Borden banquet at Winnipeg, 500 men sat down to the feed and there was an overflow of 150 more. That's nothing wonderful. The Tories are a hungry crowd these days and respond with alacrity to the dinner bell.

The London, G. B., Chronicle observed some days ago that Mr. Borden is a weak leader, and now the London Saturday Review declares that the federal opposition suffers for want of a leader. They seem to have a very correct estimate of Mr. Borden in London.

The Manufacturers' banquets to Mr. Tarte seem to have been suddenly discontinued. He is no longer a minister, and shorn of power, his late admirers have little use for him.

Mr. Chamberlain has decided to visit South Africa and personally examine into the conditions there. He will leave for there next month and remain until March.

The boot and shoe manufacturers of Canada are said to be arranging a combine of interests with a capital of \$8,000,000.

The Dominion Government has proclaimed Monday, May 25, as a public holiday for the observance of the King's birthday.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the well known woman suffragist and writer is dead at New York.
