THE DEATH PENALTY.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 27.—Judge Graham
this morning sentenced Geo. Cooke con-
victed Saturday of murdering his wife, to
be hanged January 13th.

[While in a state of intoxication Cooke
slashed his wife's throat from ear to ear.
He had been married to her only one
week, and had other wives living. His
trial commenced Friday and closed Satur-
day evening, the jury rendering a verdict
of guilty.]

RECEPTION FOR BORDEN.

Unhappy Ireland.

London, Oct. 27.—The apprehension
with which the government views the

condition of Ireland can be judged from
the fact that the chief constable of Bir-
mingham has issued a warning to all
arms ammunition manufacturers not to
sell goods for shipment to the proclaimed
districts of Ireland. A special order has
also been issued that, even in such parts
of Ireland as are not proclaimed, ship-
ments of arms must be clearly marked as
such, under pain of stringent penalties.

SCHEME FELL THROUGH.

Tory Manufacturers were Raising a Big

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—At a private meeting
of the manufacturers in Halifax after the
annual meeting it was decided to raise

ing the tariff.

A good many subscriptions were col-
lected when it was discovered by Liberal
manufacturers that the fund was likely
to be devoted to the Tory party or at any
rate for the benefit of the Tory party.

Liberals are therefore it is said, refus-
ing to subscribe and the likelihood now is
that the matter may be dropped
altogether.

Conservative manufacturers are now of

fly in the face of the government in the
manner suggested. They do not think

facturers and consumers would be the
best way to help their cause.

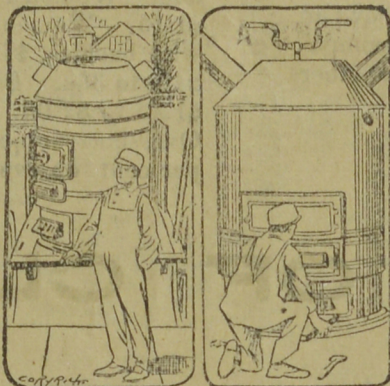
