BURNING CHIMNEYS

Create Excitement and Give the Firemen Lots of Exercise.

An alarm of fire from box 24, corner of Westmorland and Queen streets, created quite a lot of excitement on Saturday evening. There was a high wind at the time, and the striker on the city hall bell getting out of order and running wild caused the whole fire department to turn out. Fortunately the cause of the trouble was nothing more serious than a burning chimney on the tenement house, adjoining the Orange Hall, the property of St. Ann's church. The sparks and flames from the burning soot shot high in the air, and those first upon the scene must have thought that a volcanic eruption had taken place, and that the city was threatened with a fate similar to that which overtook St. Pierre and Pompeii. The half century's accumulation of soot burned with great vigor, and made quite a spectacular display. The firemen remained on the scene until all danger had passed, and saw to it that the falling sparks had no chance to do mischief.

The firemen were again called out at nine o'clock last evening to look after a burning chimney on Mrs. Blackmer's residence, Saunders street. It was not a very serious affair and there was no particular need of the services of the firemen.

A Gifted Elocutionist.

Miss Marguerite Curtis, who is to take part in the concert to be given in the Opera House Wednesday evening under the auspices of the L. A. Wilmet Mission Band, is an elocutionist of more than ordinary ability, and a genuine treat is in store for those who patronize the concert. Miss Curtis is a native of Blackville, but has made her home in Boston for a number of years, and received her training as an elocutionist in that city. She has appeared a number of times before large audiences at the Hub and invariably came in for flattering notices from the press. At the great public reception in honor of Admiral Sampson, given at the Charleston navy yard some years ago, Miss Curtis gave several readings, and was afterwards warmly complimented by the Admiral on her ability as an entertainer.

Hunting Notes.

Dr. B. M. Mullin, and Harry Blair, of St. Marys, who have been hunting on the headquarters of the Keswick since Wednesday, with Avery Moorehouse as guide, returned home Saturday evening. The doctor shot a magnificent deer, said to be the largest ever taken on the Keswick, and left the head with Mr. Moorehouse to be mounted. The animal weighed when dressed no less than 250 pounds. 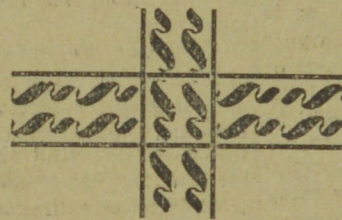
