REDUCTION IN FREIGHT RATES.

Winnipeg, Jan. 21.—In the legislature last night Premier Roblin announced that New Canadian Northern Railway port, Port Arthur would be ready to accept through traffic, Feb. 1st when there would be a reduction of two cents per hundred pounds off wheat from Brandon and intermediate points. The present rate is 14 cents, another reduction of two cents is promised.

SMALLPOX MATTERS.

Discussed at a Meeting of the County Board of Health.

A meeting of the County Board of Health was held at the office of Dr. Mullin in this city yesterday afternoon. All the members were in attendance, also Dr. Young, secretary of the Maine State Board of Health who has lately been doing duty at McAdam for the York and Carleton Boards.

The annual report of the chairman for submission to the municipal council was taken up and adopted, and the accounts for the year were passed.

The recent outbreak of smallpox in the County of Charlotte was considered, and it was decided to place a guard on the great road leading to McAdam and instruct him to intercept all persons endeavoring to leave the infected district. It was also decided to communicate with the Boards of Health of Charlotte, Carleton and Fredericton, with a view of securing their cooperation in the adoption of whatever measures may be necessary to prevent the disease from being brought into their respective districts from St. John or points west of Vanceboro.

J Wesley Hoyt, of McAdam, who has been a member of the board for a number of years, and has rendered most efficient service to the county, has found it necessary to tender his resignation on account of ill health. George J. Green of McAdam is being mentioned as a probable successor, and his appointment would be satisfactory to the people of the western part of the county.

It was decided to ask the county council to make an appropriation of \$3,000, it

being felt by the board that that amount is necessary to meet the obligations incurred or to be incurred in dealing with smallpox. It is understood that the Rush case at St. Mary's has already cost the county \$1,000, and the patient is still under the doctor's care. There was also considerable expense incurred in establishing quarantine at McAdam and East Waterville, where at one time an outbreak of the disease was threatened.

Safety of Railway Travelling.

Sir Edward Watkin was emphatic in defending and championing railways. On one occasion, when the frequency of railway accidents had been alluded to, he said: "I have proved that railway traveling is safer than walking or driving, than going up and down stairs, than watching agricultural machinery, and even safer than eating, because it is a fact that more people choke themselves while performing that act in England alone than are killed on all the railways of the United Kingdom."

MUST SURRENDER.

Chamberlain Gives Boers to Understand That There

WILL BE NO PEACE OFFERS FROM THE BRITISH.

London, Jan. 21.—The first important debate of the session began in the House of Commons last night, on an amendment made by Frederick Cawley to the address in reply to the speech from the throne. While the amendment constituted a recognized part of the opposition programme, strangely enough it was not supported by a single front bench.

The debate, however called out Mr. Chamberlain, who vigorously took the field in defense of the war. He made the significant statement that if, as Lord Roseberry's speech intimated, the Boers believed they could at any time secure a repetition of Lord Kitchener's terms he wished to inform them that they were mistaken. Mr. Chamberlain added, however, that the programme was not one of extermination. The Boers had already been offered terms whose liberality surprised even England's most severe critic. Since they had been rejected the government did not propose to embarrass itself with a further specific offer and certainly would not withdraw the proclamation of August 7, 1901. It would not propose any general confiscation of property. Justice would be meted out for military offences and other crimes. But there would be a large amnesty and the government expected to extend to the conquered people full political rights so soon as practicable. The government would not be deaf to any reasonable peace overtures it might receive.

Mr Chamberlain said that the magnanimous treatment of the soldiers of the confederacy should be upheld as an example and it had been suggested that the course of the United States in that matter should be followed in South Africa.

"I am willing to accept the parallel," said the colonial secretary, "while the lives of the soldiers were spared, no political conditions were given the confederates while their property was confiscated on a tremendous scale. I see no reason whatever to believe that an unconditional surrender would permanently alienate a conquered people. It did not in the case of the United States, although it did not lead to immediate harmony, but after a period which is a mere trifle, in the life history of a nation, it did lead to complete reunion.

Mr. Labouchere (Liberal) declined to support the amendment of Mr. Cawley, because it pledged the Liberals to vote supplies for the war. He described Lord Roseberry as "the serpent in the Liberal Eden."

John Dillion (Irish Nationalist) proposed the omission of that clause of the amendment providing funds for carrying on the war, and the addition of a clause denouncing the policy of concentration camps.

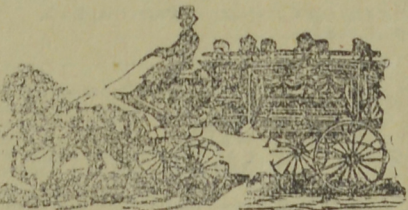
Mr. Dillion's amendment was rejected by a vote of 283 to 64, the majority of the Liberals voting against it.
