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CLOSING HIS MINISTRY.

Appreciative Words for Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Chapman From the Methodist Quarterly Board.

The life of the Methodist minister is one of continual change, and within the next three or four weeks there will be many changes of home to the minister and family of that denomination.

Since their arrival in Fredericton nearly one year ago, Rev. Dr. Chapman and Mrs. Chapman have won many friends, not only among their own people but among all classes of our citizens, and their removal in two or three weeks will be generally regretted. After a long and successful ministry—extending we believe over forty-five years—the present popular pastor of the Methodist church in this city will spend his retiring years in Amherst, N. S., where is well known and highly esteemed.

At a recent meeting of the official board of the Methodist church this body gave expression of its estimation of Dr. Chapman in the following resolution:

Resolved, "That this Quarterly Official Board, in fourth session assembled, desires to express its warm regard for Rev. Douglas Chapman, D. D., pastor, and its appreciation of the successful work he has so faithfully and judiciously accomplished during the year now closing. We gladly place on record the fact that as pastor, preacher, and friend he has endeared himself to the large congregation under his charge. His willingness to undertake the responsibility of this large circuit proved a great relief to the officials of the church, and his intercourse with our people in the public services of the sanctuary as well as in the home, not only in a social way but when as pastor he brought comfort to those in trouble and consolation to the bereaved, will long be cherished in the memory of Fredericton Methodists.

"We also desire to give expression to our appreciation of the great help Mrs. Chapman has been to our people in the church, in the parsonage, and at the fire-side of our homes; and our prayer is that after his long itinerant Dr. Chapman and his estimable partner may dwell in green pastures and be led beside the still waters for many years before the end comes."

UNIVERSITY OF N. B.

Student Makes an Appeal Against Abolition of one of the Chairs.

To the Senate and Graduates of the U. N. B.

The minds of the general public, and particularly the minds of the students and proposed students of the U. N. B. are revolving the question—"Can the University of New Brunswick afford to do away with one of the chairs which it now maintains?" To this query there is but one answer, a very emphatic, "It can not."

Shall this institution which for over one hundred years, had weathered all its difficulties, be hampered thus when the number of students is on the increase? Who will attend a declining University, and what else will it be considered, by outsiders at least?

One of the other professors may do the work. Yes, if one can be found among them able and willing to do two men's work, assuredly it might be given him. But usually a sensible man is not inclined to limit the period of his usefulness to a few years. Or, perhaps, it would meet the approval of the majority to divide the branches among the different professors. How much easier then the work of each professor would become! Each subject, too, would be treated with much greater skill, and would be attended with much greater success when undertaken by these already overworked professors, than when they have been dealt with by a specialist. While taking up this additional burden, the original work of each far from losing its former excellence would become superhumanly efficient. But one argument in favour of the above arrangement seems to carry great weight, and certainly is an undeniable fact; the professors are not properly paid for the work they do. But, ere long, if the number of professors is diminished the remainder will lecture to empty seats. Could not the salary of each professor be slightly increased without doing away with a most important chair? There is no reason why their salaries could not be increased, and more than that they should be. One hundred years hence when your descendants sit in your places and review the annals of the past, they will be ashamed that you were willing to place so small value on all the wealth of men's minds.

Shall this University, honoured for its (to us) quite shadowy past; honoured for the memory of the many men, who have laboured within its walls, during the century that is gone; honoured for the men who have gone forth from their Alma Mater, some to fame, others to noble work in quieter fields; shall this University lose its efficiency of the past for the sake of a few paltry dollars?

NINE SAILORS WENT DOWN.

Whaleback Steamer Sank at Duluth.

TWO ONTARIO MEN ON THE LIST—THE THOMAS WILSON.

Loaded With Iron Ore, Collided With the Geo. C. Hadley.

Duluth, June 8.—The whaleback steamer Thomas Wilson was sent to the bottom of Lake Superior by the steamer George G. Hadley just outside the harbor entrance to-day. Nine members of the Wilson's crew were lost. The dead are: Aaron Tripp, cook; Frank—, second cook, Toledo; James McDougall, oiler, Manitoulin Island; Joseph McGraw, wheelman, Sault Ste. Marie; John Campbell, lookout, Greenleaf, Mich.; John Cared, deckhand, St. Catharines, Ont.; Thomas Jones deckhand; William Roebuck, fireman, Port Lambton, Ontario. The Hadley was bound into port with a cargo of coal, and the Wilson was bound out with a full cargo of iron ore. Immediately after the crash the Wilson went to the bottom. The survivors say that not more than a minute elapsed after the collision before the boat sank. The captain of the Hadley instantly realized that his boat also was sinking, and started at full speed for the beach, which he reached just in time. The Wilson went down in 60 feet of water and is a total loss. She belonged to the Steel Trust and was worth about \$100,000. She was of the whaleback type, and was one of the best of these boats ever built. She came out of the West Superior shipyard ten years ago and was 308 feet long by 38 feet deep. Her tonnage was 1,773.

The Board individually mourns its loss and desires to express its heartfelt sympathy with his bereaved widow and family."

Day, was over turned near Sandyville, and the occupants were violently thrown out. but fortunately no serious damage was done. The little boy is doing nicely today.
