THE LUMBER DRIVES.

A General Rise of Water in the River and New Logs are Running.

The mild weather following the recent rains appears to be having its effect on the snow in the woods, and as a result the river is steadily rising at this point. For the first time this season new logs are running past the city, quite a number having gone down river this afternoon to the Lincoln booms. Reports from up river state that there has been a general rise of water and that logs are running quite thickly.

William Noble, Jr., who came down from the head waters a few days ago, reports that Kilburn's logs were running out of the northwest branch of the St. John early last week. It is supposed that these logs are part of a lot which Mr. Kilburn was obliged to abandon in the brooks last spring.

Reports from the Miramichi districts are not of a very encouraging nature. It is said that Welsh and Lynch's crews on the southwest and branches have only been able to work five days since the first of April. The nights are still quite cold in that locality and the snow does not melt rapidly enough to do any good. The drives on the Lower Dungarvon, belonging to Ernest Hutchinson, James Robinson, M. P., and others, are coming along very well and will be out in a day or two.

The Gibson Company's drive of twenty millions on the Nashwaak and tributaries is all in safe water, and should be in the boom limits before many days. The main drive is near Stanley and Coun. R. L. Young is at Nashwaak Village with a large running drive.
