A FINE CONCERT.

Westminster Abbey Choir Delighted a Large Audience.

The concert by the Westminster Abbey Choir last evening, surpassed all expectations and was beyond a doubt one of the most enjoyable musical events our people have ever been privileged to attend in this city. The opera house was filled to overflowing with a thoroughly representative audience and it is needless to say the efforts of the concert party merited and received the warmest appreciation of all present.

The concert party is made up of fifteen people, including six boys sopranos, eight men and one lady, Madam Hooton, contralto and everyone is an artist of the first rank. The program consisted of old English Glee songs by Madam Hooton, Robert Hilton bass, Mr. Branscombe tenor, and Master Phillips soprano, selections by a male quartette and choruses by the party. Every member was enthusiastically applauded, and an encore was demanded and given in every instance.

The gem of the evening was the solo Master Phillips, who is said to be the leading boy soprano in England. He possesses a voice exactly like a woman's and appears to have perfect control over it. His notes are clear and sweet and his articulation is splendid.

The baritone solo by Mr. Hilton was listened to with much pleasure, and he further delighted the audience by giving for an encore number "Rocked in the cradle of the deep." Mr. Branscombe and Madam Hooton also made a great hit with their vocal selections.

The concert was a grand success throughout and the music lovers of Fredericton and vicinity owe a debt of gratitude to J. E. McMurray for having induced such a high class company to visit the city.

A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

Dr. Hetherington Badly Injured and His Horse Killed at St. John.

St. John Sun: A deep trench which extends two-thirds across Douglas avenue about opposite Geo. E. Day's residence was responsible last night for the death of a valuable horse and for severe injury to Dr. Geo. A. Hetherington, superintendent of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum. The trench, which was dug by the sewerage department, is a dangerous one, and it is claimed that it is insufficiently lighted and that the way the lights are placed it is difficult to tell which side of the road to drive on while passing it.

Dr. Hetherington was driving out to the asylum last night shortly before twelve o'clock. Nearing this place he turned in the wrong direction and the horse, instead of clearing the end of the ditch, plunged head first into the middle of it, throwing the doctor violently to the ground, breaking his nose and cutting his face and hands severely. In spite of his injuries he managed to walk to the asylum, where his wounds were dressed.

The force of the fall killed the horse instantaneously, and the waggon also was badly smashed.
