THANKSGIVING.

The people of Canada will unite tomorrow in rendering thanks to the Almighty for the blessings of the past year. And the debt we owe to the Creator is a heavy one.

Never before in the history of this country has such prosperity abounded in Canada as during the past year. On the farm, in the manufactures, in the mines, in commercial circles, among the tradesmen, there has been success, good crops, abundance of work for all. The country has also enjoyed immunity from plagues and other disasters, and the people are buoyant with hope and filled with pride in their country, its resources and prospects.

A pleasing feature of the year is the great influx of settlers to the great north west, which is to be the home of prosperous millions.

Canada has enjoyed the blessings of good government, of extended civil and religious liberty, and its progress in all lines has been phenomenal.

Let us therefore return hearty thanks on the morrow for all the blessings of the year, acknowledging that the source from which they all come is an all wise and all powerful Creator, Whose bounty is as wide as His grace and mercy is abundant.

The University football team will not draw the color line with the Acadia kickers, a worthy example to the Truro connoisseurs. In the meantime the men from the hill must beware of the proverbial hard head of the African. A practical test of the tradition was given the other day in Virginia, when a 32-calibre pistol ball was fired at a distance of twenty feet squarely into the middle of a colored man's forehead, and after breaking the skin flattened itself against the bone. The man was able to go to police headquarters, a block away to have the ball extracted, and is now alive and well. The University boys don't want to run against a head like that in the scrim.

The issue is distinct. Judge Hanington in court at Andover declared that crime is rampant in this province, and that juvenile depravity is due to the lack of religious instruction in the public schools. Chief Justice Tuck at St. Andrews said that no province in Canada or state in the American Union is freer from crime than New Brunswick, and gave as his opinion that the places where religious instruction should be imparted to children are at the fireside, in the church and Sunday school. Those who know Judge Hanington do not believe that he will allow the Chief Justice to have the last word.

Perhaps some of our Paardeberg heroes may recognize two of the Boer visitors. These gentlemen were present at the early morning serenade of Cronje's camp, and no doubt did their best to repel the Canadian attack. We are brothers now, and we welcome our distinguished fellow colonists with a true British welcome.

The Boer farm delegates applauded Jessie MacLachlan's rendering of Rule Britannia at St. John, which goes to show that the visitors have not only a soul for music, but an appreciation of British supremacy.

The opposition sneered at Mr. Emerson's oil policy, but an expert engineer reports that the New Brunswick oil fields are more promising than any except those of Pennsylvania, and much superior to California.

MR. BLAIR AT VANCOUVER.

Minister and His Party Welcomed by
New Brunswick Friends.

(Vancouver World Oct 7)

There arrived in Vancouver this afternoon one of Canada's leading statesmen, a member of the Dominion cabinet, in the person of Hon. Andrew G. Blair, minister of railways and canals. He is accompanied by Mrs. Blair, Miss Thompson, Mrs. Blair's sister; Miss Blair, Mrs. Walter Clarke, formerly Miss May Blair; Dr. McCarthy, and Mr. Payne, the minister's private secretary.

The party came in on Mr. Blair's private car and were met upon arrival by a number of New Brunswick friends. Mr. Blair looks remarkably well and has changed little since he was attorney general for New Brunswick. The minister was very non-committal when interviewed, and stated that he had nothing to give to the newspapers that would interest the people of British Columbia.

"I had some business," he said, "out west of Winnipeg, and having got that far, came to the conclusion that I might as well come to the coast. Our visit will be a short one. We expect to leave for Victoria this evening and will return to-morrow night and after spending a day in Vancouver, proceed eastward again. This is truly a magnificent country," he added, and referred to the beautiful scenery which they had passed through. A few days were spent at Banff and Lake Louise was also visited. The other members of the party expressed themselves as delighted with what they had seen. Mrs. Blair, Miss Blair and Mrs. Clarke have many New Brunswick friends in Vancouver, who will have an opportunity of calling upon them on their return to this city, when they will stay at the Hotel Vancouver.

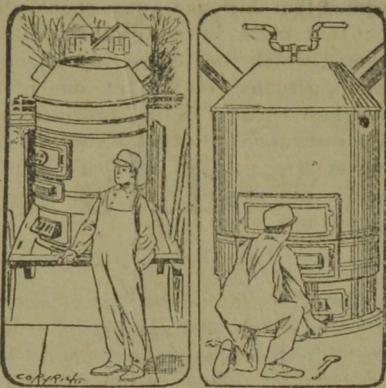
