MR. DEPAUW'S MOOSE HEAD.

One of the Very Largest Ever Taken in
the Province.

M. T. Depauw, of New Albany, Ind. who has been hunting big game with Henry Braithwaite on the Little Southwest Miramichi returned to the city by the Canada Eastern this afternoon, bringing with him an enormous moose head, reference to which has already been made in these columns. The head is undoubtedly one of the very largest ever taken in the New Brunswick woods. The antlers, which are beautifully formed, have a spread of 62 inches, and measure 41 inches in the web. The left antler has 21 points, and the other 10, making 31 in all. As can well be imagined the moose, which carried these immense antlers was much above the average size. It took two bullets from a 577 rifle to bring him to his knees, and he was found to measure 7 feet 4 inches from the top of his shoulders to the soles of his feet.

Mr. Depauw, who also secured a nice caribou, is naturally very much elated over his good fortune and will return to New Brunswick next season. He leaves for home by this evening's train.

Mr. Braithwaite returned from the woods with Mr. Depauw bringing with him the head of a moose shot by himself, which had antlers measuring 57 inches.

Mason Benner and D. H. Mast, of Dayton, Ohio, who have been hunting at Clearwater with Benniah Norrad as guide also returned to the city today. Each secured a fine moose, Mr. Benner's having an antler spread of 57 inches. They leave this evening for Brownville, Me., to spend a few days deer hunting.

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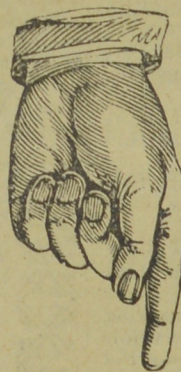
