

BADLY SMASHED UP

Allen Glover Who Fell
From Moving Train
Near Harvey

ARRIVED AT VICTORIA HOS-
PITAL IN TERRIBLE
SHAPE.

Compound Fracture of Leg, a
Broken Thigh and Other
Injuries.

VICTIM DESCRIBES HOW THE AC-
CIDENT OCCURRED.

Allen Glover, the young man who was hurt on Thursday night by falling from a train near Harvey, arrived at the Victoria Hospital this morning. Dr. Keith found on examination that he was very seriously injured. His leg was broken in such a way that the bone protruded from a large wound and the upper part of his thigh was also broken, and it is feared that he is injured in the lower part of the back. The hurt on his head does not appear to be very serious.

Mr. Glover states that the accident happened near midnight. He was returning from Ft. Junction and intended getting off the train at Harvey. As the train was approaching the station, he went down on the steps of the car to see if the lights of the station were visible, and put his foot on a piece of loose board which happened to be on one of the steps. This caused him to lose his balance, and he was thrown over the railway embankment which is very high at that point. He struck on a pile of rocks and lay there unconscious for some time but afterwards recovered consciousness and crawled up the embankment where he was found by the sectionmen in the morning.

He was suffering terribly and was thoroughly drenched by the rain which fell most of the night. Glover's injuries were attended to at the hospital this afternoon by Dr. Geo. J. McNally.

The young man is badly broken up, and it will be several weeks before he is able to get around again.

HIS SERVICES APPRECIATED.

W. E. Smith Tendered His Resignation
as Treasurer to the Synod Which
is Loath to Accept.

At the Church of England Synod, St. John, Thursday, the resignation of the treasurer of the synod, W. E. Smith, of this city, was read by the secretary, to take effect not later than December next. His action was rendered necessary by constantly increasing duties in other directions.

In speaking of the resignation his lordship said that Mr. Smith had done splendid work as treasurer and had organized the work on a most satisfactory basis. If the resignation were accepted a resolution of sorrow and of appreciation of his services should be passed.

W. B. Wallace moved that the resignation be referred to the executive, and Rev. Mr. Montgomery moved in amendment that it be accepted, and that the synod pass a resolution of appreciation of Mr. Smith's services and regret at his departure.

During the discussion which followed, Judge Hanington said that the treasurer's salary of \$500 was entirely insufficient. It should be increased and a sum added for the necessary travelling expenses. He expressed high appreciation of Mr. Smith's services and supported the motion advocating the further consideration of his resignation by the executive committee.

Mr. Montgomery withdrew his amendment, and Mr. Wallace's motion carried.

Canon Roberts then moved, seconded by Dean Partridge, that the next session of synod be held in Fredericton, July 1903.

In amendment Ven. Archdeacon Neales moved, seconded by Rev. J. de Soyres, that Woodstock be named as the place of meeting.

The amendment carried.

The result of the election of delegates to the general synod was:

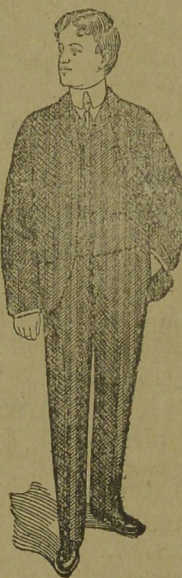

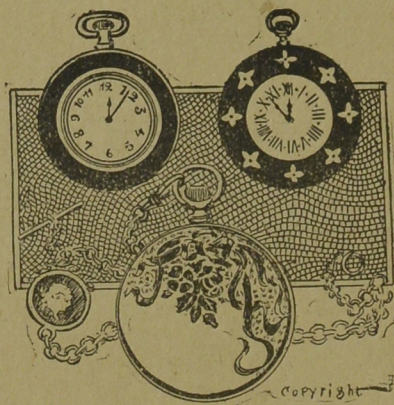
