THE EAGLE'S SCREAM.

We do not pretend to know much of the Boston Record's standing, whether it represents the thinking, intelligent portion of the community in which it is published, but we should judge from a recent utterance of that paper that it has developed a bad attack of jim jams or some other ailment which has deranged its mental capacity.

Under the headlines of "The United States Must Have Canada," the Record is pleased to observe:

"We can well afford to stop our foray in the Philippines, our buying of bankrupt W. Indian islands, our interference with China, but Canada is naturally a part of our territory, and the only menace to our peace which exists. With Canada in our hands, the Monroe doctrine would practically execute itself. With Canada, the interests of our country commercially would be more prospered than with all the tropics. We could afford to buy Canada, or to encourage her people to demand admission to the Union. But Canada we must have, and the true American in public life will make that one of the fundamental stones in his foundation,—Canada must become a part of the United States."

A Boston friend who sends the Herald a marked copy of the Record containing the above article, requests us to answer the silly tirade, but it would be labor lost to trouble about so foolish an exhibition.

The Record, however, is respectively informed that Canada is not for sale, not for all the gold that can be minted in the United States in a thousand years. Neither can we be taken by force so long as we have our own stout arms, and the backing of the mother land to defend us from foes without. There may be further expansion of the great republic, but it will never be northward. There is room on the North American continent for two great nations and Canada will some day be one of them. We shall certainly never be annexed to the United States, but we are rapidly annexing hosts of the republic's citizens. Thousands of them are entering our great North West every week, and we hope to convert them into good Canadian citizens and loyal British subjects.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME.

Although Premier Tweedie has been mingling freely with the princes and lords of British society in London, has travelled extensively on the continent during the past few weeks, and has been feted as New Brunswick's representative at the coronation celebration, he expresses himself as glad to be back to the more humble surroundings of his homeland which has signally honored him as a public man, and is prepared to reaffirm confidence in him as a political leader.

The welcome extended to the Premier and his lady was characteristic of Miramichi hospitality, and must have been very pleasing to the recipients. In his address Mr. Tweedie discussed some of the important occurrences that have attracted so much attention in Canada during the past few months, but his reply to the welcome was more of a social character, and breathed a spirit of love for New Brunswick, and faith in the future of this province. His contrast of the conditions in England where a large class of the people find nothing better to do than to hang on the doings of the aristocracy, with the sturdy independence and industry of our own people was a pleasing commentary on the excellence of existence in a free country. untram-

melled and unaffected by class distinctions and worship of an upper crust.

The Herald unites with the premier's hosts of friends in welcoming him and his excellent lady home. They have seen much and learned much, but no doubt they appreciate more than ever the warm hearts of the people among whom their lots are cast, and who rejoice that the opportunity was given the first minister of the province to take part in the stately ceremonies attending the crowning of the King.

THE MEAGHER INCIDENT.

The Maritime Board of Trade at its meeting in Sydney endorsed Mr. DeWolfe, of Halifax, by electing him vice president for Nova Scotia. Mr. DeWolfe is the gentleman who was arrested on the order of Judge Meagher for protesting against the latter designating the board of trade members "blackguards" because while being photographed on the court house steps they obstructed His Serene Highness's exit. The Board also passed a resolution of thanks to Mr. DeWolfe for the manly way in which he resented the judge's insult. This resolution was moved by ex-mayor Stephen of Halifax, who declared that "Judge Meagher is not only a disgrace to the city of Halifax, but to the bench, and not a fit man to occupy the position that he does."

The judge has returned to his home at Halifax, but declines to talk about the incident. When a Chronicle reporter sought an interview the judge appeared rather snappish. "Why should I make any statement?" he demanded. "The newspapers have misrepresented me. They have lied about me again and again. When the proper time comes for me to make a statement I will do so."

The proper time for the judge to make a statement has passed. He should have apologized on the spot to the members of the Board of Trade, who'rent being insulted by even a supreme court judge.

THE WEATHER AND CROPS.

Unusual weather conditions have prevailed this year in the maritime provinces, and indeed all over eastern Canada and the New England States. It has been decidedly cool and stormy. In this province the promise of an early spring was followed by a late opening, and continued rain, while welcome to the lumbermen, was not favorable to farmers getting their seed in the ground. The lumber eventually came out with a rush, and between rains the agriculturists succeeded in planting. There was a great deal of grumbling among the farmers whose prospects in the early part of the season were not alluring, but in spite of the excessive rainfall and the cool weather, nearly every kind of crop has flourished, and the farmers will have full barns and storehouses when the harvest is all housed, with the promise of good prices for their surplus products.

The Central Railway accident in which fireman Braud was killed occurred May 28th, and the coroner's jury have just rendered their verdict, that the deceased came to his death by the falling of the bridge. Some valuable time seems to have been wasted by somebody, and in the meantime, the railway has been closed down and will be for some weeks yet. A rigid government inspection of the Central seems to be required in the public interest.

Premier Ross of Ontario, who has returned from Europe, will find sufficient to tax his political tact and ingenuity in piloting his government through the storms which assail it. Under present conditions he has a majority of only one, but there is no telling what the bye-elections may develop.

Mr. Borden, the Conservative leader, is to make a political pilgrimage to the west this autumn, but his party would be the gainer if he remained in Halifax.

The St. John exhibition opens next Saturday evening and one of the attractions will be Mr. Tarte. The exhibition promises to be a success.
