

SPLENDID SHOOTING.

A. E. Massie's Record at the Provincial Rifle Matches.

WON A PRIZE IN EVERY COMPETITION.

Led the Grand Aggregate With a Capital Score.

HIS TOTAL CASH WINNINGS IN EXCESS \$80.

A. E. Massie, who attended the P. R. A. matches at Sussex, returned home last evening and is being overwhelmed with congratulations by his many friends on his great success with the rifle. His total winnings in cash amounted to the respectable sum of \$80, which is said to be the largest ever taken by an individual marksman in the history of the association. The prizes at Sussex are not large, and to win the amount carried off by Mr. Massie, one has to be very near the top of the prize list in every competition.

Mr. Massie won four first prizes, one second, the D. R. A. silver medal and a gold badge, in addition to several small money prizes. In every match in which he was allowed to compete he secured a prize.

For the information of our readers interested in rifle shooting, we have obtained for publication Mr. Massie's scores in detail. By way of explanation it may be stated that a bull-eye counts 5 points, an inner 4, a magpie 3, and an outer 2, the first shot in each case being a "sighter" which does not count in the score.

In the all comers' match, seven shots at 600 yards, he scored as follows:

3, 5, 4, 4, 4, 2, 5, 5—Total 29.	
The Domville match was shot at two ranges, seven shots at each distance, and Mr. Massie scored as follows:	
500 yds—2 5 5 5 5 5 5.....35

Mr. Massie won first place in the Prince of Wales match, but being a civilian he was not allowed to take the silver cup. In this match seventeen shots were fired, seven at 200 yards and ten at 500. Mr. Massie acquitted himself as follows:

In the provincial match, ten shots at 600 yards, Mr. Massie made the following score:

The association match, the most important of the meeting, was shot at Queen's ranges and Mr. Massie won second place with the following score:

Mr. Massie led the field in the grand aggregate with the handsome score of 304 points, the best ever made at Sussex. His total was made up as follows:

In extra series A. five shots at 600 yards, Mr. Massie and Capt. Smith, a Bisley veteran, each put on the possible score. In the shoot off for first place Mr. Massie scored 14 out of a possible 15, and Capt. Smith only 10. In the Extra series match at 800 yards, Mr. Massie scored 23 points out of a possible 25, twice in succession.

Mr. Massie is the captain of the Fredrickton rifle club, and his splendid work at Sussex, should be very encouraging to the members of that organization, and will no doubt awaken a greater interest in rifle shooting in this locality. It is to be earnestly hoped that Mr. Massie will find it convenient to attend the D. R. A. matches, which open at Ottawa on Sept. 1st.

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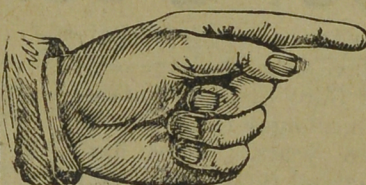
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
