Matters Dealt with at a Meeting of the

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY EXECUTIVE.

Standing Committees Appointed for the Show.

NEGOTIATIONS WITH JOHN MACPHERSON FOR A LOT OF LAND HAVE FALLEN THROUGH.

A meeting of the executive of agricultural society No. 34 was held at the office of Secretary Hooper yesterday afternoon, those present being Vice President Hilyard, J. D. McKay, W. S. Hooper, Geo. Y. Dibble, C. Fred Chestnut, D. Lee Babbitt, D. McCatherine, F. W. Hatheway and C. H. Giles.

A list of the standing committees as made up by the general chairman was submitted to the meeting and approved as follows:

A finance committee was not appointed, its functions having been taken over by the executive.

The committee to whom was referred the matter of enlarging the exhibition grounds by acquiring an adjoining lot, submitted a report. The substance of it was that the committee had been unable to make terms with John Macpherson, who owned the land in rear of the exhibition grounds, and recommended that no further action be taken. They had offered him \$300 for a lot 119x333 feet, but he had declined to accept it, and had fixed his price at \$400. The report was adopted and no further action will be taken.

A communication from W. P. Flewelling, Secretary of the Frederick Park Association, offering to sell the park buildings to the association, was received and placed on file.

Several applications for the position of caretaker of the exhibition buildings were read, but as the present arrangement is satisfactory it was decided to take no action towards filling the vacancy before spring.

The question of making an importation of pure bred sheep was discussed, and all present seemed to favor the idea. It is quite likely that an importation will be made in the fall of 1903.

The question of importing seeds for the benefit of members of the society living in the country, was also favorably considered.

The opinion expressed was that the importation should be made through local dealers.

The delegates to the Maritime fat stock show, Messrs C. H. Giles and W. S. Hooper, were voted their expenses and Mr. Giles refunded the amount of his to the society. Messrs J. D. and William McKay, will attend the show as delegates from Farmers Institute, No. 34.

Some small accounts winding up the business of the year were passed, after which the meeting adjourned.

Venezuelans Will Resist British and German Encroachment.

BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE

Disclaims Responsibility for Sinking Warships.

TORIES ATTEMPTING TO DISQUALIFY BRUNET.

THE VENEZUELAN CRISIS.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

London, Dec. 12.—The foreign office has given out an announcement disclaiming responsibility of Great Britain for the sinking of Venezuelan war vessels.

Caracas, Dec. 12.—There is no disposition on the part of the Venezuelan people to accede to the demands of Britain and Germany, and patriotism runs high.

There has been a call to arms and resistance. At La Guaira the fortifications are being put in shape.

Washington, Dec. 12.—A despatch from Caracas says that Venezuela is anxious to arbitrate.

A VACANT CONSTITUENCY.

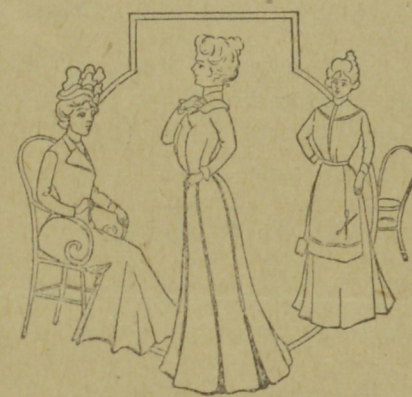
