EXCELLENT SPEECHES

Made in The Budget Debate in
The Legislature

BY MR. FISH AND MR. O'BRIEN.

Two of Northumberland's
Sturdy and Respected
Representatives.Speaking of the budget debate in the
Legislature, Mr Fish of Northumberland
said:

At this advanced stage of the debate on the resolution to go into supply I feel I can safely congratulate the opposition on the feebleness of their efforts to decry the management of the affairs of this province by the government. As I recall the various subjects that have been discussed I am led to believe it is rather a battle between the "ins" and the "outs" than any charge of mismanagement or incompetence on the part of the government. Although the opposition have bombarded the government with increased expenditure, extravagance, favoritism, remedial bill, Rothesay list, small-pox and religious and race cry, I fail to see they have strengthened their position or have shown any reasonable grounds for asking further support from the country, and here let me say I think the opposition make a great mistake when they drag the religious or race cry upon the floors of this House. It is an unwelcome visitor here, or anywhere else, under the flag that floats for the freedom and liberty and equal rights we enjoy, and it need only be resorted to for selfish or unworthy motives, which cannot be justified. There is room for us all here, and the least injustice to any one, finds speedy resentment in that spirit of fair play which characterizes the world-wide brotherhood of our advancing civilization.

The opposition deserve appreciation for their careful scrutiny of the report and auditing of the public accounts, but unfortunately they confine their observations entirely to increases in amounts of expenditure as if the government were squandering the revenues of the country. They tell us the public debt has jumped from \$800,000 in 1882 to 3½ millions today, and that the government has \$80,000 more to spend than their predecessors. There are more bill board phrases set up that they who run may read. The intelligent people of this province know full well the cause of our bonded indebtedness, our subsidies to railways, our permanent bridges and other important services demanded by the people are represented therein. Do the hon. gentlemen contend that our province would have been better without those expenditures? I think not. The superiority of the present over the past I think fully justified the liability.

Now, the floods of the past few days will make unexpected demands on the revenue of the province and these demands must be met. Even without such emergencies the people will be crying out for good roads, and more of them, and more bridges, and the government will have to yield to these demands. He did not know but what it might be good policy to borrow \$1,000,000 for permanent improvements rather than expend from year to year an amount equal to the interest on the loan and temporary repairs.

He had no doubt that the principle of the Quebec resolutions of 1887 would be recognized by the Dominion Government and that we should obtain better terms. The member for Carleton has referred to the teachers being treated unjustly. This rebate of 10 per cent, on their grants was made 15 years ago because the Government of that day found it necessary to do so. The Government had either to reduce the grants or give some of the teachers none. Teachers were now getting good salaries and those of the higher grades could command almost any salary. He thought it spoke well for our school system that some of our teachers were asked to go to South Africa. The leader of the Opposition referred to the census not being satisfactory and said we should get some device to keep our people at home. If he has any good advice on this subject to give he should not withhold it from the House. The exodus was due to the restless condition of our people to better their condition,

COSTLY FEASTS.

What It Has Cost the City of London to
Entertain Royalty.

Exactly a quarter of a century ago the City Fathers were welcoming another Prince of Wales from India, and it has been estimated that the £27,000 spent on the reception was twice the weight the King Edward in those days. Years before the city had spent nearly as much in celebration of the Prince's wedding, £10,000 being the price of a necklace of which Queen Alexandra may well be proud even now that she has a crown. Far back in the 60's the Sultan came from Yurkey, and the city spent £24,000 to make him happy for a single day. Sixteen thousand satisfied the Shah, and the Czar of all the Russias was entertained the following year for only £13,000.

What the city will spend next year the city only knows. The coronation of Queen Victoria, we may be sure, is no precedent for in 1837, when the Queen attended the Lord Mayor's banquet, the entertaining bill was hardly more than £8,000, and fourteen years later, when the Queen again visited the city, the cost of the visit to the corporation was less than £6,000. Queen Victoria's visits to the city, indeed, were the least costly of all the Royal visits to the Lord Mayor's kingdom. Thanksgiving Day for the recovery of the Prince of Wales cost the city £13,000, and the 1887 Jubilee celebrations accounted for an expenditure of nearly £12,000. Altogether the nine Royal celebrations mentioned cost the city over £130,000—an average, to be exact, of £14,868 for each Royal visit.

Whether the city has made up its mind to be more economical or not one does not know, but in our own time the city has entertained the German Emperor, the Shah of Persia, and the King of Denmark for an aggregate sum of less than £8,000—less than a third of the sum spent on welcoming the Sultan in 1867. It would seem almost as if the coronation were returning to the simple ways of their fathers, who entertained George II. at a cost of £37 13s. and King Victor Emmanuel for £1 38s.
