CANADIANS IN SOUTH AFRICA.

They were Canadian soldiers who administered the final stroke that compelled the surrender of Cronje and his army at Paardeberg, and they died and were wounded by the score in that daring midnight attack on the Boer laager. They are also Canadian soldiers who are reported by Lord Kitchener at Hart's as submitting to death then surrender a position to the Boers. "The Canadians held their post till every man was wounded or killed, and the Boers could not be forced to renew the attack."

Brave Canadians, heroic men who have laid down their lives for the Empire. Who shall say that loyalty to the crown and love for the fatherland is less strong in the colonies than within the very shadow of the throne. We mention Paardeberg with patriotic pride, and we shall emblazon Hart's River in memory of brave Canadian deeds. No surrender, no running away from the enemy there. The Canadians fought and died rather than throw up their hands, and yield their liberty, British liberty, to the enemies of their country.

It is not definitely known how many Canadians were engaged in the fight, but here's the record.

"Second Canadian Mounted Rifles—Killed, nine non-commissioned officers and men.

Wounded—40 non-commissioned officers and men.

Officers—None killed. Severely wounded: Lieutenant R. H. Ryan, in fore arm, slightly; Lieut. George McKay, in hand, Lieut. Ralph Markham, in the arm, Lieut. W. P. London, in shoulder."

Is it any wonder the members of the Canadian House of Commons broke out in cheers when the Minister of Militia announced the gallant conduct of our men at Hart's River, and made the observation that "While this is very sad news, there is this satisfaction to be taken out of it, that the Canadians are maintaining the reputation they have already earned in South Africa, and that they continue to prefer death to surrender."

Two maritime province officers, one of them a young man who received his university education in Fredericton, are among the wounded. Lieut. Ralph Markham, of St. John, and Lieut. Ryan, of Kentville, were both members of the first Canadian contingent, and when the last contingent was being organized were among the first to volunteer for further service.

Cecil Rhodes' will appoints seven of his friends as general executors who will undertake to act as trustees for the educational endowment fund. He has left a sum roughly capitalized at \$10,000,000 for the foundation of Anglo-American scholarships at Oxford, for three years. The central principle of his scheme is that to every English speaking colony and every state and territory in the

American union should be offered a scholarship of the value of \$1,500 a year for three years at Oxford University.

The proposed importation of thoroughbred horses by the local government will be popular with the farmers of the province. The legislature has voted \$15,000 for that service, and Hon. Mr. Farris, the popular and efficient commissioner of agriculture, may be depended upon to make the best possible use of the money.

The Legislature has voted all the items of Premier Tweedie's estimates, the majority of them going through with little comment and less criticism from the opposition. The other business of the session is also well advanced, so that prorogation can take place in a very few days. The government and especially the Premier, as leader of the House, are entitled to great credit for the prompt and efficient manner in which the work of the session has been conducted.

PRINCE TO VISIT UNITED STATES.

New York, April 5.—A London cable to the Times states that the Prince of Wales will be a visitor to New York next October, to attend the dedication of the new home of the Chamber of Commerce, and that he will also tour the United States under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. Every Item of the Estimates Passed After a Brief Discussion.

CHIEF COMMISSIONER ASKS A VOTE FOR MORE STEEL BRIDGES.

In the legislature Friday afternoon Mr. Labllois introduced a bill to further provide for steel bridges, permanent structures and also for the freshet. He explained it was intended to provide additional steel structures, and also permanent work for other bridges, such as stone foundations and to cover the amount necessary to repair the damage by the freshet. No sum was yet named in the bill.

The order of the day was then taken up and the house went into committee on supply and passed all the items.

The resolutions were reported to the house and leave asked to sit again. On the item for education Mr. Lawson asked if there would be any grant for technical education under the Sloyd system.

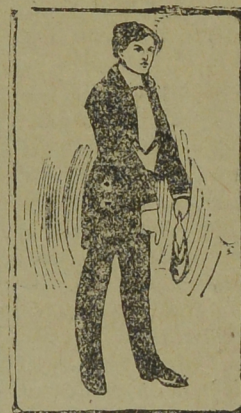
Hon. Mr. Tweedie replied that a bill would be introduced to provide for that. Mr. Appleby inquired about the small-pox expenses.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said the government will pay half the costs incurred by the municipalities for smallpox.

At the evening session Hon. Mr. Farris introduced the bill to provide for the importation of horses. He said the purchase would include thoroughbred, coach and heavy draft horses, all of which would be bought in Canada and the United States. It was the intention to add a section authorizing a grant of \$800 in aid of the Maritime Stock Show at Amherst and of \$500 towards assisting in the establishment of a plant for dredging mussel mud. Progress was reported.
