

TRAMP CAPTURED

Who Did the Stabbing
Near New Denmark,
Victoria Co.

HIS VICTIM, YOUNG PETERSON,
IN A CRITICAL CONDITION.

Row Originated When Tramp
was Seeking Food.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Grand Falls, N. B. April 26.—The tramp wanted in connection with the stabbing affair at Foley Brook near New Denmark was captured yesterday twelve miles below by George Jensen and another Dane.

The tramp, who is a hard looking specimen of humanity, about fifty years of age, admits having committed the deed. He said to your correspondent on the train, that he was first attacked by young Peterson and only defended himself. The tramp gave his name as John Johnson, though it is said his proper name is Anderson.

The story told by Johnson and one Murphy, at whose house the affair took place, is that on Wednesday the tramp who had been in this neighborhood for some days, called at Murphy's house and asked for something to eat, at the same time using harsh language to Mrs. Murphy.

The latter's son was at Andover but young Peterson, who was in the house, told the tramp he had better go to work.

The tramp attacked Peterson with a two edged knife and cut his throat, severing the wind-pipe. Drs. Wade and Rouleau report that the patient's condition is serious.

The prisoner was brought to Foley Brook today for identification, and will be taken to Andover jail.

The young man is resting fairly well today but the chances for his recovery are slight.

THAT SHIPPING COMBINE.

HAGGART EATS CROW

Ex-Minister of Railways
Compelled to Swallow
a Slander

WHICH HE HAD CIRCULATED
AGAINST HON. DR. PUGSLEY.

Hot Time in the House of
Commons.

Ottawa, April 26.—In his speech in the House of Commons yesterday, Hon. H. R. Emmerson spoke of Hon. Mr. Haggart's charge that Hon. Dr. Pugsley was negotiating the sale of the I. C. R. in New York.

He read a telegram from Dr. Pugsley. It was dated St. John, N. B., April 25, and addressed to A. G. Blair: "I see by parliamentary report in this morning's papers that Haggart said that Meyer, of New York, had informed him I had been in New York negotiating for the sale of the Intercolonial. The story is a pure falsification from beginning to end. I never either wrote or spoke to Meyer or any one else on the subject of the sale of the Intercolonial, or authorized any one else to do so. I have not been in New York for many months and have no acquaintance with Meyer." (Sgd.) WM. PUGSLEY.

Mr. Emmerson said that Mr. Haggart ought to produce his authority or make an apology to Dr. Pugsley.

Mr. Haggart—The honorable member will be told the authority on which I made the statement afterwards."

Mr. Haggart said he got the information about Dr. Pugsley from an officer of the Dominion Securities Company. He read a couple of extracts from a letter. These were to the effect that Dr. Pugsley was in New York negotiating for the sale of the Intercolonial, but that Mr. Blair had gone there and told Dr. Webb that the sale of the Intercolonial was entirely out of the question and could not be entertained. To the surprise of the house Mr. Haggart sat down without giving any name, seeing that a few minutes before he had assured the house that he intended doing so. There were, therefore loud cries of "Name, name," from all parts of the house.

Hon. Mr. Blair said that Mr. Haggart had promised to give his authority and in all fairness he ought now to do so. It is only fair to Dr. Pugsley that he should do this. His (Blair's) name had also been mentioned in connection with the matter and the name should be given. The house ought to know who had made these statements.

R. L. Borden thought it sufficient when Mr. Haggart gave the name of the Dominion Securities. It was an officer of the Dominion Securities and that ought to be enough.

Mr. Blair said Mr. Haggart had made certain charges on certain information which he said he got and this being desired by Dr. Pugsley the name of the party should be given so that the inquiry should be still further pursued.

Mr. Haggart—"I merely gave it as a New York rumor. I gave it for what it is worth."

Mr. Blair again called Mr. Haggart's attention to having made the statement, to his having told the house he would give the authority and now that it was desired the name should be forthcoming. Mr. Haggart said that if Dr. Pugsley, denied it he was willing to accept the denial at once. It was given him as rumored in New York.

There were cries of "Name, name." Mr. Haggart—"I will write him. If he says that I cannot give it, then I will withdraw."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said it was no authority to say that the man was an officer of the Dominion Securities. A reply that a corporation had said it was not satisfactory.

Mr. Emmerson—"Did the honorable gentleman get the information from Mr. Powell?"

Mr. Haggart—"I never had any conversation with Mr. Powell on the subject."

Mr. Emmerson—"The only other available information is Archibald. (Hear, hear.)"

The discussion went on for some time along these lines, but still Mr. Haggart would not give the name.

Hon. Mr. Blair gave a most emphatic denial to the report that he ever authorized anyone to negotiate for the sale of the Intercolonial.

Mr. Fowler (King), said he would acquit Mr. Blair of being connected in any way with the sale of the Intercolonial. Mr. Blair knew the feelings of the people of New Brunswick too well to do anything of the kind. He would say that along certain lines Mr. Blair had improved the administration of the road to a considerable extent.
