

THE GROWING WEST.

M. B. McNally Talks to the Herald of His Recent Trip.

A COUNTRY OF WHICH CANADIANS SHOULD BE PROUD.

A Great Wheat Crop Will Be Harvested This Fall.

A CHANGE OF OPINION IN REGARD TO THE MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The HERALD on Saturday briefly noted the arrival home from a trip to Western Canada of M. B. McNally of Queensbury and Lewis H. Perley, foreman of J. C. Risteen & Co.'s factory. They left Fredericton just four weeks ago, and went right through to Alberta, N. W. T., where they remained for nearly a week, guests at the Alberta House, the proprietor of which is Henry Perley, a native of Queensbury, York County, a brother of Lewis Perley and brother-in-law of Mr. McNally. Leaving Alberta the party proceeded to Revelstoke, B. C., where Mr. Perley conducts another large hotel for the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Here they remained for three days, and enjoyed a fishing trip on the Columbia River and had an opportunity to look over the great timber lands in that section. Mr. McNally says they saw trees of cedar, Douglas fir and pine which had attained a height of over two hundred feet. Many of the tallest were less than three feet thick at the butt, and were as straight as a gun barrel.

While at Revelstoke Mr. McNally called upon the merchant to whom he has been making shipments of maple honey for several years past, and learned from him that the demand for the Queensbury product greatly exceeded the supply. He wanted a much larger consignment forwarded next season, and Mr. McNally promised to comply with his request.

On the way home Messrs. Perley and McNally made short stops at Winnipeg, Toronto, Buffalo, Niagara Falls and other places, and had an enjoyable time sight seeing.

Mr. McNally, who is one of the most successful farmers of York county, was profoundly impressed with the agricultural possibilities of the great West. "It is a marvellous country," said he, "and is destined to one day become the granary of the world. Immigrants are pouring in rapidly, both from Europe and the United States, but so vast is the country that at the rate homesteads are being taken up it will take a hundred years at least before it will be as thickly settled as our eastern provinces. Were I a young man with a little capital," said he, "I would certainly go west and engage in farming, but under the circumstances I guess I will remain in New Brunswick."

Mr. McNally spoke enthusiastically of the crops in the west, and was confident that the yield of wheat would be the greatest in the history of the western country. They had a wet, backward spring similar to ours, he explained, but there is a much larger acreage under cultivation than last year, and the farmers will need all the help they can obtain from the east to get the crop properly housed in good season.

"The trip west" said Mr. McNally, "has opened my eyes to the greatness of Canada, and there is no longer any doubt in my mind that we have the greatest and richest country in the world."

"You might say," said Mr. McNally in conclusion, "that while I haven't exactly turned grit, I have altogether changed my opinion in regard to the Hon. J. Israel Tarte. I will state positively that I believe him to be the brainiest and most wide awake man in the government today, and there is no man in the Conservative party who can hold a candle to him. He has been making a trip through the great lakes and has given the people up there a great waking up on the transportation question. I tell you Tarte is a hustler and no mistake. I had not the pleasure of meeting him on my trip, but came pretty near it, and was sorry I didn't, for I would like to have grasped him by the hand."

Speaking of Mr. Henry Perley, Mr. McNally says he has been a resident of the west for twenty-three years, and is regarded as one of the most popular and successful hotel men in that country. His wife is also a York County lady, being a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Hammond of Kingsclear, and like her husband is much esteemed by the travelling public.

GOSSIP FROM LONDON.

Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, addressed a large meeting in Liverpool Friday night. He told of the resources of Canada, and proposed that 500 army horses be purchased annually from the Dominion.

The Canadian coronation contingent sailed for Canada on the steamship Corinthian on Saturday.

DEATH ON THE RAIL.

A BIG SYNDICATE.

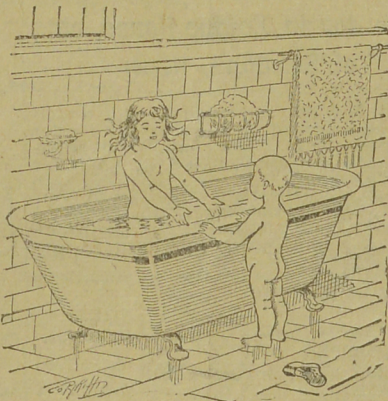

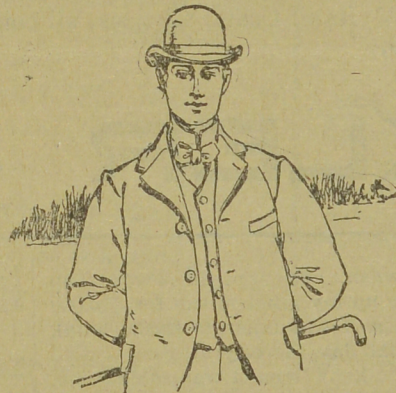
