THE IRONY OF FATE.

A Young Society Man Had Trouble
Getting to the Country.

The heavy down pour of rain on Saturday evening put the roads in a wretched condition and rather upset the plans of a number of people who had arranged to spend Sunday with friends in the country. A popular young insurance agent was among those disappointed in the weather, but having an engagement that would not keep until another Sunday should roll around, he made up his mind to reach a popular summer cottages a few miles below the city where a young lady from out of town is stopping, or die in the attempt. After carefully considering the transportation question, he arrived at the conclusion that a horse-back ride would be the most congenial under the circumstances. Donning the captain's pig skin leggings and spurs, he proceeded to a livery stable, procured a charger and started out. He had not covered a mile of his journey when he noticed that his mount was breathing hard, and thinking that perhaps the animal had been injured, he slowed up and invited an expression of opinion on the subject from a friend who chanced to be passing. The friend pronounced the equine's ailment a bad case of heaves, whereupon the rider promptly wheeled about and put back to the stable. The saddle and bridle were transferred to another horse, and soon our hero was again cantering summer cottage-ward. He got along swimmingly for the first half mile, and then, with scarcely a moment's warning, the horse came to a full stop and positively refused to budge another inch in the direction he was heading. The spurs were applied with great vigor, but it was no use, and at last the now almost disheartened rider was compelled to turn him about and retrace his steps back to the stable. At first he thought of trying the saddle on a third horse, but after he had inspected the liveryman's herd, he arrived at the conclusion that after all the good old fashioned method of travel by horse and wagon was the best. Though somewhat provoked at his ill luck he was not in the least discouraged, so engaging a horse and buggy, he hastily removed his spurs and leggings and for the third time within an hour set out for the summer camp. This time luck remained with him and he made the journey without mishap and no doubt spent a most enjoyable afternoon and evening. After his experience of yesterday our friend is said to be more firmly convinced than ever of the truth of the old adage, "that the course of true love never did run smooth."

Recent Deaths.

Frederick Moore, the well known lumtorman, died Sunday afternoon at his home at Woodstock, aged about 70 years. For some years the deceased had been suffering from Bright's disease of the kidneys, which was the cause of death. Mr. Moore was a large employer of labor in his mills and lumber industries and at present owns a mill in Aroostook county. He leaves a wide circle of friends. He is survived by the widow, two sons, Miles and George, and two daughters, Mrs. Harry Grant and Miss Mary Moore.

Frank T. Hilyard, son of Ald. Thos. R. Hilyard of St. John, and nephew of Postmaster Hilyard, of this city, died at his home Saturday of tuberculosis, aged 25 years. Deceased was a much esteemed young man with many friends in this city.

The funeral of the late Judson Estabrooks took place from the homestead on Charlotte street this afternoon, when a large number of relatives and friends assembled to pay their last tribute of respect to his mortal remains. A very impressive service was conducted at the house by Rev. J. H. MacDonald, the choir of the Baptist church rendering several appropriate hymns. A VETERAN PRINTER

Passed Away at the Ripe
Age of 93 Years.SPENT MOST OF HIS LIFE IN
FREDERICTON.Death of Edward Yardy at
Woodstock.

Mr. Edward Williams of Woodstock, who is a guest at the Barker House, received a telephone message from home this morning announcing the death there of Mr. Edward Yardy a former well known and respected resident of Fredericton, at the ripe old age of 93 years.

The sad event occurred at 2 p.m. Sunday at the residence of Mrs. W. H. Everett, daughter of the deceased, where he had been recently making his home.

Mr. Yardy was a native of Queenstown, Ireland, but came with his parents to St. John when a lad. He was apprenticed to the printing business with the late Mr. Cameron, father of Mr. John Cameron, of the Fredericton post office. On attaining his trade Mr. Yardy came to Fredericton, entering the employ of Hon. John Simpson, Queen's printer, succeeding shortly afterwards to the position of foreman in the Royal Gazette office which he occupied continuously for forty-five years, until retiring from active work sixteen years ago, since which time he has resided with his daughters in Boston and Woodstock. Mr. Yardy in his younger days was a volunteer, and with his corps, the artillery, saw active service during the threatened Aroostook war. His wife, who died here in Nov. 1883, was a daughter of the late Richard Smith, of this city. They had five daughters and one son, and four of the former survive, viz: Mrs. Everett, of Woodstock; Mrs. Butterfield, Mrs. Welch, and Mrs. Vail, of Boston. His son, Edward Yardy, jr., died about a year ago in Boston.

During his long residence in this city Mr. Yardy enjoyed the esteem of a large circle of friends. He was a man of sterling character and a consistent member of the Church of England.

The remains will arrive from Woodstock this evening and will be taken to the residence of Mr. Alex. Burchill. The funeral will take place at 4 p.m., tomorrow, from Mr. Burchill's residence, services at the Cathedral, interment in the old burying ground. John G. Adams will have charge.

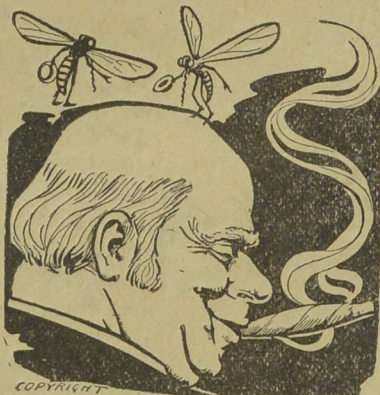
Wednesday's Excursion.
