THE LAST CHANCE.

London, Dec. 8.—In the House of Commons to-day, Premier Balfour, announced that an ultimatum has been sent to Venezuela. In the event of a satisfactory reply not being received, the British and German governments, will take measures to enforce their claims against Venezuela.

BIG IRRIGATION SCHEME.

Montreal, Dec. 8.—Improvements considered at Executive meeting of the C. P. R. today include the irrigation of two and a half million acres of semi arid lands in the district between Calgary and Medicine Hat.

The expense will be enormous. Water will be conveyed from Bow River to Plain at a cost of \$3.00 an acre. The plan promises success, as Mormons living on irrigated land are growing rich, owing to good crops.
