

FOR CAMP SUSSEX.

The R. C. R. and Detachment from the 71st Regiment

TO GO UNDER CANVASS FOR TWELVE DAYS.

Will Leave by Special Train at Ten O'clock Tomorrow Morning.

No. 4 company of the R. C. R., consisting of 53 non-commissioned officers and men in command of Capt. Lister, and seven officers and 45 non-commissioned officers and men from the 71st regiment in command of Major John E. Sansom, will leave by special train tomorrow morning for Sussex for twelve days training. All will parade on the barracks square at 9 o'clock and march to the C. P. R. station where they will entrain.

The officers of the 71st from this locality going into camp are Major Sansom, Capt. and Adjutant W. S. Fisher, Capt. W. H. Grey, G. A. Murray, James W. Howe, J. F. Winslow and Lient. Ross. Capt. Thomas will command the detail from the Fredericton Junction company, Capt. Ryder that from St. Stephen and Capt. McLaughlin that from Milltown.

Following is the text of a recent regimental order by Lient. Col. Loggie commanding the 71st regiment:

Fredericton, N. B.,
Sept. 2, 1902.

1. Lt. Col. Loggie and Major J. D. Chipman having been granted leave of absence from Camp Sussex, the command of the details from the regiment going into camp will be taken over by Major J. E. Sansom.

2. Details from No. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 7 companies will proceed from Fredericton at 10 a. m., Sept. 9th, by special train; details from No. 5 company will proceed on the train from Fredericton Junction.

3. The quarter master, quartermaster sergeant and one man per company will proceed to Sussex on Monday morning, Sept. 8th, and take over camp equipment and to erect tents.

4. Officers will provide themselves with New Infantry training drill book of 1902, and badges of rank as provided in G. O., 56, of June 1902.

5. Officer of the day 9th Sept., Capt. J. J. F. Winslow; next for duty, Capt. G. W. H. Thomas.

6. O. C. Companies will see that the company books are taken into camp including the service roll books, and that all men are properly enrolled, and none selected except those medically fit. N. C. officers will bring their rifles and side arms, the men will wear clean serges (no rifles or side arms).

Capt. A. E. Massie, the new Quarrier of the 71st regiment, accompanied by Quartermaster Sergeant Fred Walker, Sergt. William Long, and Private Myers, went to Sussex by the 10 o'clock train this morning to take over camp equipment, and superintend the erection of tents, etc. An attachment of men from the R. C. R. composed of Corp. Spotterswood, and Privates Coates, Endall, Hyde, McLaughlin, Matheson and Myrshall, went to Sussex by the same train to pitch tents for the company.

Surgeon Major Bridges of the Army Medical Service, who is to act as P. M. O. of the camp, will accompany the R. C. R. to Sussex tomorrow morning.

The members of the R. C. R. band will go in the ranks, but will take their instruments to Sussex with them.

The non commissioned officers and men from the 71st are to parade at the drill hall at 9 o'clock in marching order with great coats rolled and worn over the left shoulder.

Big Game Hunters.

A party of American big game hunters composed of W. H. Goodwin of Dedham Mass, and W. B. Long, H. A. Pittman and N. C. Nash of Boston, arrived here by the western train today and registered at the Queen. They are en route to the northwest Miramichi woods to hunt moose and caribou in company with Arthur Pringle and Sydney, the well known Stanley guides, and left by the Canada Eastern at four o'clock. Pins in England.

In England the ordinary domestic pin had become in the fifteenth century an article of sufficient importance to warrant legislative notice. An act of parliament passed in 1483 prohibited the importation of pins. As a necessity of the toilet pins were introduced into England in the latter part of the fifteenth century by Catherine Howard, queen of Henry VIII., who received them from France.

Very good pins of brass were made at this period, but a large portion of them were made of iron, which was blanching and sold for brass pins. In order to prevent this imposition upon the good people of England parliament in 1543 passed an act providing that "no person shall put to sale any pins but such as shall be double headed and have the heads soldered fast to the shanks of the pins, well smoothed, the shanks well shapen, the points well rounded, filed, canted and sharpened."

England continued to depend upon France for its supply of pins till the year 1626, when John Tilsby introduced the manufacture into Gloucestershire. In 1636 the manufacture was introduced into Bristol and Birmingham, the latter place ultimately becoming the great center of the industry.

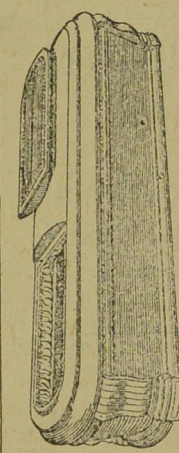
A Matter of Sex.
