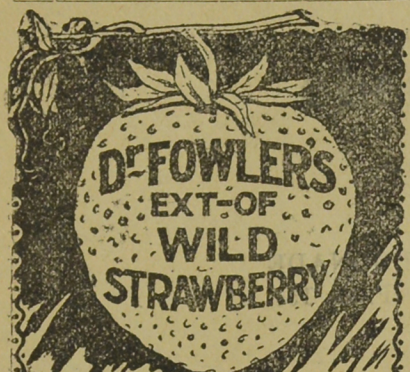

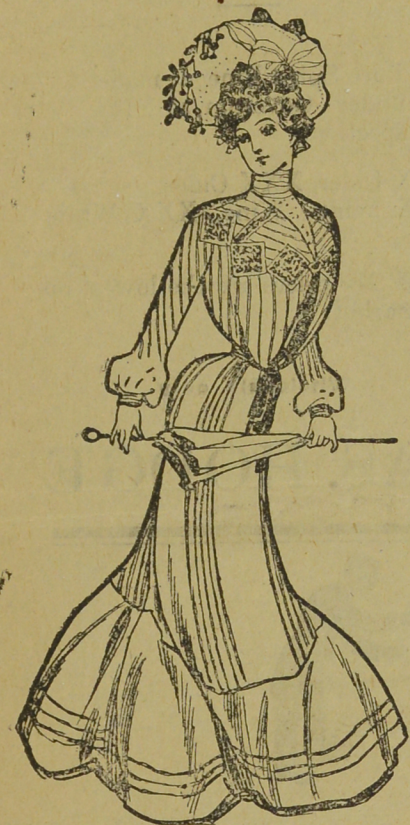

FANCY COLLARS AND TIES.

Silk Mull Fichus, Wash Collars and Stocks.

Bertha collars of embroidered batiste appear on very many of the new gowns. Another fashionable mode for linen dresses shows a short, oddly shaped bolero with stole ends of lace and edged around the sides with narrow bands of stitched linen. The bolero is worn over a tucked blouse of embroidered batiste.

Thin white wash goods and net make equally effective fichus. A flower bordered fichu is as dainty a piece of apparel as one could wish for.

In the wash ties and neckbands fashion still clings to the pique stocks of white, with narrow colored ties. The knot seems to be superseding the bow, and many of the new stocks have the ties simply crossed over and fastened with a fancy pin.

Many collars are made of insertion and featherstitching. They fasten in the back and taper down into points in the front.

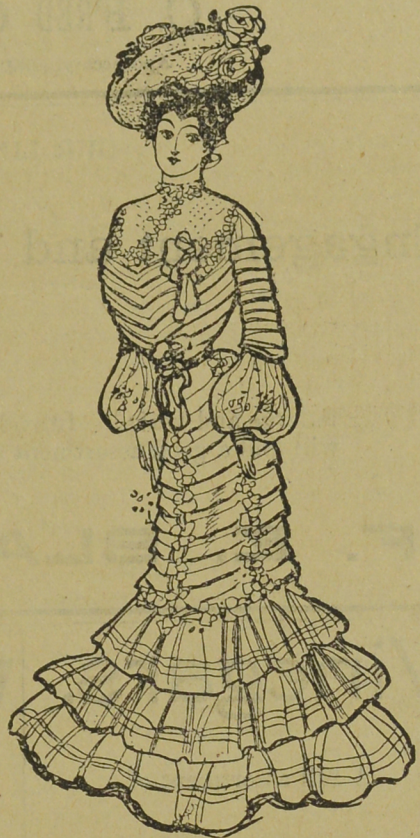

FASHIONABLE GOWNS.

Many Are Made of Filet Lace—Boleros Still Popular.

Filet lace is much used for summer gowns. It is frequently trimmed with bands of pongee or silk. The foundation of this lace is a square meshed lace on which a pattern is worked in darned fashion. It has rather the effect of an old sampler. Gold or silver tinsel on black or brown is exquisite with a touch of color.

The bolero, like the blouse, has apparently come to stay. Chiffon and mous-

selline are applique with heavy textures or bits of silk, and the bolero in this fashion is fitted loosely and is fastened with bows of colored velvet set on in the front.

So far there is little change in the fashion of skirts, but short ones are in the minority and are rarely seen except for athletic sports.

A costume of gray velling is shown in the cut. Both waist and skirt are laid in wide bias tucks. The skirt has three tucked ruffles. The waist is collarless and is trimmed with a yoke and undersleeves of white chiffon. Bands of white silk applique also aid in trimming the waist and skirt.

SANDSTORMS.

Sand and dust whirls occur in arid regions in hot weather. They may be anywhere from a rod to several rods in diameter and from twenty to a thousand feet high. They are sometimes compound, a score of more small whirls forming a whirling circle around a common center. They are very common in India. They sometimes carry up so much sand in the Sahara and Arabia that those on whom the sand falls are overwhelmed. They occur also in the arid regions of the United States.

In the Magdalena valley, across the mountains westward from Socorro, in New Mexico, during a hot day in summer they form at the head of a valley in a long, slender, vertical column perhaps 600 feet high and then travel down the valley toward the village of Magdalena, over which they burst sometimes, bringing little puffs of contrary winds and a shower of fine dust. In some places a group of stationary whirls of the same general character as the preceding is tied down to one point. Such are the whirls which form sometimes over volcanoes.

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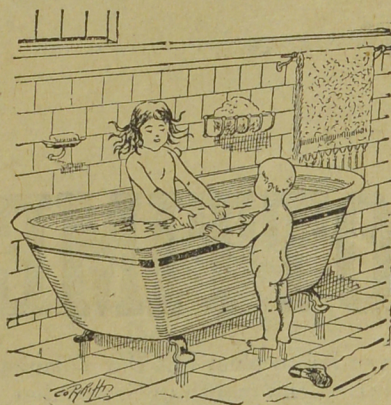
