### Well Known People Who Have Passed Away.

#### DEATH OF C. J. THOMAS.

Former Well Known Frederictonian Passes Away at Concord, N. J.

The many friends of Mr. Charles J. Thomas, formerly of this city, will be shocked to hear of the death of that gentleman at Concord, New Hampshire, where he has been residing for several years. The sad news was conveyed to Mr. C. Sterling Brannen, uncle of the deceased, Saturday evening, death having taken place that afternoon.

Mr. Thomas was a son of the late Mr. John Thomas who more than a quarter of a century ago did a dry goods business where Mr. F. B. Edgcombe's establishment is now located on Queen street. The deceased was for a time a leading salesman with Mr. Edgcombe and was a well known and popular young man. He removed from this city nearly twenty years ago, finally settling at Concord, his mother joining him there about five years ago. Mr. Thomas' death was due to consumption. His remains will arrive here tomorrow evening and the funeral will take place from Mr. Brannen's residence, Union St., Wednesday, with services at the Cathedral.

Great sympathy will be felt for the bereaved mother, who has seen her husband and three children removed by death within the past few years, and who recently has not been enjoying good health.

David Bell.

David Bell died Saturday night at the residence of his brother-in-law, John Christie, Regent street, this city, aged 49 years. He was a native of St. John, but had lived for many years at Brockton, Mass. He came to Fredericton a couple of months ago, to visit his friends, and developed cancer of the liver and jaundice which caused his death. His wife is dead but he leaves two daughters and two sisters, one of them is Mrs. John Christie, at whose home he died. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 2 p. m., under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias. R. B. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

#### Died Very Suddenly.

Miss Margaret Perley daughter of the late Thomas Perley of Sheffield was found dead in bed at the residence of Charles B. Barker, Sheffield, Sunday morning. She was 75 years old. The funeral took place at 3 p. m., today, with R. B. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

Mrs. James Moore.

The death occurred at Bear Island on Wednesday last of Mrs. Moore, widow of the late James G. Moore of that place. Her death was due to old age, she having reached her 79th year. She was the mother of fourteen children, eleven of whom survive her. They are Leverett of Boston, Duncan and George of Milbrooke, Maine, Dudley and Sylvester of Houlton, George, who resides on the homestead, and Mrs. Charles Burnett of Pokiok, Mrs. Joseph Scribner of Boston, Mrs. John McLean of Bear Island, Mrs. Cornelius Manual of St. Stephen, and Mrs. William Brown of Pokiok. The funeral took place on Friday at Bear Island, with services at the Union Church by Rev. William Ross of Prince William.

Charlotte F. Giles.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Giles, Kingsclear, are mourning the death of their daughter, Charlotte Fredericka, aged 11½ years, who passed away last night after five weeks illness from scarlet fever and kidney trouble. Deceased was a sweet, winsome little girl and the sympathy of their numerous friends is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Giles in their great bereavement. The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. Wednesday, with services by Rev. H. Montgomery of St. Peter's church, Springhill and interment in the cemetery there.

Miss Augusta Ann Lister.

The death occurred this morning at her home on George street of Miss Augusta Ann Lister, sister of J. W. Lister, caretaker of the Parliament building. She had been ailing for some time and her death was not unexpected. The deceased lady was in her 86th year. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 4:30 o'clock, with services at St. Ann's church by Rev. Canon Roberts. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

Mrs. O. M. Hartt.

A telegram from Fairville this morning announced the death at that place of Mrs. Hartt, wife of O. M. Hartt, of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, this city. She had been an invalid for nearly two years and her death was not altogether unexpected. The deceased was in her 47th year and leaves in addition to a sorrowing husband, a family of three sons

and three daughters to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother. The eldest son Wilbur, is a resident of Brooklyn, New York, and has been notified by telegraph. Mrs. Hartt was a daughter of the late Benjamin Kilburn of Kingsclear and a half-sister of John Kilburn, the well known lumberman of this city. Mr. Hartt went to St. John this morning and is expected to arrive here this evening with the remains. Interment will be made at Kingsclear at two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

#### D. AND D. ENQUIRY.

G. Ernest Powers on the Witness Stand.

At the enquiry Saturday afternoon G. Ernest Powers, in reply to Mr. Gregory, stated that he came to New Brunswick in December, 1883. He was born in Birmingham (England) and was a nephew of Mrs. Woodbridge. He had lived with Mr. Woodbridge for two years at Oldham and Glasgow. He had been almost continuously at the institution since 1883. He was absent from May, 1897, until July, 1898. For the first three years his principal duties were teaching, but afterwards collecting. He did some teaching chiefly in winter. His time was pretty fully occupied. He collected in Quebec Ontario, Maine, P. E. Island and part of New Brunswick. He spent about three and a half months on the Quebec and Ontario trip and about one month each in P. E. Island and Restigouche and Gloucester. Three weeks were occupied in Maine and five or six weeks in St. John.

He remitted his collections while on the trip and on his return to Fredericton gave Mr. Woodbridge a statement of his expenses and money collected. Mr. Woodbridge did not keep a record of his expenses. He prepared the list of subscribers for the annual report. Whatever names were in the collection book were transferred to the report. Some firms paid their subscriptions with goods, such as Emerson & Fisher, C. M. Bostwick & Co., Davis, Lawrence & Co., and Brayley & Co. Some subscribers did not pay at all. He had never made any calculation of the ratio of expenses to collection.

Howard Woodbridge was a collector in 1897. He took the St. Stephen district. He also did some teaching.

He remembered about the Summerside subscription list of 1896. He remembered in the autumn of that year, after many had been sent out, that the Summerside list had been omitted. A printed slip, with the names, was sent out to the Summerside subscribers. He did not know how the list was overlooked.

When Noel Dedham came to the institution he had only the clothes that were on his back. He had several shirts on. The boy was sick a considerable time and got whiskey and milk to drink. He could not make any comparison between the pupils of the Fredericton school and that of other institutions. He did some office work and assisted Mr. Woodbridge with correspondence. The boys often collected driftwood and logs in the spring from the river. Some of them got their feet wet. The pupils had amusements in the form of swings, cricket, baseball, see-saws, etc. In the winter they had checkers and playing cards. Both the boys and girls had to do some work.

The inquiry was adjourned until Tuesday, when Mr. Phinney will cross-examine the witness.
