## Star Line.

## Off the Board.

George Sims, who has conducted a private stage line for the past year from Fredericton to Meductic, has disposed of his outfit and retired from the business.

## New Telephone Wires.

The telephone company is engaged in placing new wires throughout the city, and at this stage the service is somewhat interfered with. The inconvenience is being minimized by the employees, and in a couple of days all will be running smoothly again.

## Drowned at Calais.

Thomas Chambers, a young man belonging to Calais and employed as a seaman aboard a schooner now in that port, was drowned Saturday night. He was ashore during the evening and started to return late at night. His dead body was found on the shore yesterday morning.

## Old Order Restored.

Miss Sadie Thompson who has been ill since the school vacation, resumed her position in the York street school staff this morning, and Miss Taylor who was filling her place returned to her duties at the Charlotte street school where Miss Sadie Sterling has been teaching for the past two weeks.

## Again at Work.

The Sloyd school, which has been shut down for a few weeks, re-opened this morning for the term. The teaching staff is composed of Principal E. C. McCreedy, George M. Morris and Joseph Lynn. The students of the Normal school and male pupils of the city schools from the 6th to the 9th grades inclusive will receive instruction.

## Dropped Dead.

Jas. Gallagher of Milltown, N. B., while carrying water to his house from a nearby spring Saturday dropped dead from heart failure. A little child had accompanied him to the well and returned to the house a little ahead of him. The old gentlemen not arriving promptly a search was made for him, and his lifeless body was found in the yard. He was seventy five-years of age.

## From Mount Pelee.

Joseph Howe Dickson, clerk of the executive council, has in possession a rare curiosity in the form of a small quantity of ashes thrown from the crater at Mount Pelee at the time the city of St. Pierre was swept out of existence. He obtained it from W. R. Peck of Hopewell Hill, who was in the vicinity of Martinique when the eruption occurred, in his capacity as mate of a Cape Breton ship.

## A Coming Treat.

Rev. Mr. Kempton is to deliver his popular lecture on the Land of Evangelism in this city on Thursday evening. The lecture is to be under the auspices of the Fredericton Tourist Association, from the members of which tickets of admission can be obtained free of charge. The rev. gentleman is at present preparing a lecture on New Brunswick to be delivered in the United States, and the object of his visit to Fredericton is to arouse interest in his work.

## Our Time Next Year.

Mr. W. S. Hooper, of Fredericton, who was in the city gathering ideas for the 1903 Exhibition at the provincial capital, smiled when a reporter asked for a little inside information on the big show of next summer. He said while several things had been decided upon and others were practically settled, the management were not quite prepared to tell just what the Exhibition would be like. However it could be stated that a new building almost as large as the present one will be erected at the rear of the one now standing, so as the two structures will form a T. Other new but smaller accommodations will be erected. Mr. Hooper and

## The Yacht Race.

The eighth yacht race of the local series took place on the river Saturday afternoon and was won by the Asthore, with Coleman's Doreen second, and Summer Girl third. It was quite an exciting race, and the winner had only a small margin to spare. The Asthore now stands one point better than the Doreen in the competition for the Morrison cup. Referee Barker has decided the protests filed as a result of the race of a week ago, are irregular, not having been put in writing within forty-eight hours. Under this ruling the race goes to Coleman who finished first.

One dead man and five injured have already been brought to the city by the police boat, and while it is believed that this is the extent of the casualties it is possible there are others.
