THE LATE W. K. ALLEN.

After a heroic struggle against an insidious disease which he knew would eventually end his life, Mr. W. K. Allen, a much esteemed resident of this city passed away Wednesday night, mourned by a very large circle of friends and acquaintances.

The deceased gentleman, while well and favorably known as a member of one of Fredericton's leading families, came more prominently before the public in 1890 as a candidate for the local legislature, to which he was elected two years later, retiring at the end of the term in 1895.

Mr. Allen was a gentleman of pleasing personality, highly popular in his native city, and throughout this county, and news of his death will be heard with very sincere regret. He was a courageous fighter in the political arena, but did not permit his political feelings to interfere with his personal friendships, and those who opposed his public ambitions mourn his death as sincerely as his former political associates. In business, social, and sporting circles, he was prominent and popular, and was much admired for his many manly traits of character.

During his long struggle with the disease which finally proved fatal, he never murmured, but bore his suffering with a truly heroic spirit that commanded the admiration of all who knew the sad circumstances of his case.

IN A GOOD POSITION.

The St. John Exhibition Association have decided to hold a show this autumn and have selected Sept. 30 as the date of opening. They have also chosen W. W. Hubbard, a most capable and energetic gentleman, for the positions of secretary and manager of the exhibition. The association has the full government grant of \$5,000, besides \$3,000 from the St. John common council, their liabilities have been assumed by the government and St. John corporation, the buildings are in good state of repair, and they should be able to hold a successful show and come out of the affair without the usual deficit. The St. John people might learn a valuable lesson in management from the gentlemen who had charge of the late Fredericton Exhibition.

New Brunswick horsebreeders are much interested in the mission of Hon. L. P. Farris and Mr. King, M.P.P., who have left for the upper provinces and the New England States to make a purchase of horses to improve the breeds of this province. The legislature placed \$15,000 at the commissioner's disposal for this purpose.

The Minister of Justice has introduced a bill in parliament providing that a judge resigning at any time after becoming disabled by permanent infirmity, will receive a pension equal to two-thirds of his annual salary. If he has served less than five years, his pension will not exceed one-third of his annual salary.

Evidently there are still plenty of young Canadians anxious for war service in South Africa. Recruiting commenced Tuesday for the fourth contingent and all over the country plenty of material offered. At St. John alone twenty-four recruits were accepted.

The salt industry in Kings county appears promising. It is announced that Hendrick Bros., of the parish of Cardwell in that county, have sold their farm and salt works to a syndicate of English capitalists for \$13,000.

It looks as if there were troublesome times ahead in Ireland. Sections of the Crimes' Act have been declared in force in several districts, providing for summary jurisdiction in cases of criminal conspiracy, intimidation and unlawful assembly, for trial by special jury and for change of venue at the option of the crown. These are the districts in which the United Irish League has been most active. The league itself has not yet been proclaimed, but it is believed that this step will be taken shortly.

In some Canadian cities preparations have already commenced for the proper celebration of the King's coronation. What does Fredericton propose to do? The city council should take the matter up at its next meeting. The day will be a public holiday and should not be permitted to pass without suitable recognition.

The C. P. R. magnates are doing what they can to advertise St. Andrews as a summer resort. Sir Wm. Vanhorne has had a summer residence there for some years, and now Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and C. R. Hosmer are erecting handsome residences in the same locality.

A very successful school concert under management of Wm Veazey principal of the Grammar school and Miss Bessie Scott teacher of the primary department, was given last evening to a crowded hall that was worth almost \$50.00. An entertaining and educative program was rendered reflecting great credit upon the taste of the teachers and ability of the scholars.

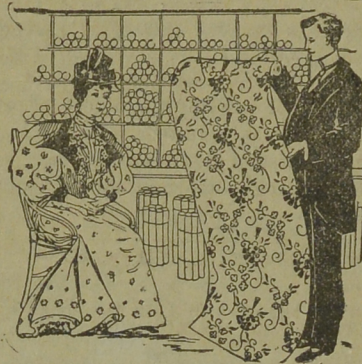
