STRAINED RELATIONS.

THE PREMIER'S HEALTH.

Ottawa, September 15.—Sir William Mulock was questioned as to the rumour to the effect that Sir Wilfrid Laurier appeared to be in very bad health.

Sir William stated that he had seen the Premier as late as Wednesday, August 27, and that Sir Wilfrid was then in most excellent health, though a little thin, the result of seasickness and close confinement to work in London.

Since the close of the conference the Premier, under the improving influences

of the open air, had picked up wonderfully and was now undoubtedly in the best of health. "He was," said the Postmaster-General, "in excellent spirits, bright and cheerful, and told me had never felt better."

PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

Hagerstown, Md., Sept. 15.—A portion of a freight train broke and jumped the track on the Potomac Valley Railroad this morning and crashed into William Bovey's residence, near Pinesburg.

The building was partly demolished. Bovey, his wife and three children were on the porch on the further side when the cars struck. They were thrown into the yard, but escaped injury. Two of the children were hurled into a pear tree.

Robert Shafter, J. W. Keyton, and James Rudy, who were boarding with the Boveys, were asleep in the building. Shafter and Keyton made a remarkable escape, while Rudy was badly injured about the lower part of the body. They were thrown from their beds through the roof, and a carload of coal fell on the very spot where the beds stood. Shafter was hurled between the floor and ceiling. Rudy was struck by flying debris and injured. They crawled out of the debris to find the Boveys sitting on the roof.

Nearly all the furniture was smashed to pieces. The cars were badly damaged and the track torn up.

The Young Partridges.

All summer long while berries are plenty the flocks hold together, finding ten pair of quiet eyes much better protection against surprises than one frightened pair. Each flock is then under the absolute authority of the mother bird, and one who follows them then gets some curious and intensely interesting glimpses of a partridge's education. If the mother bird is killed by owl or hawk or weasel, the flock still holds together while berries last under the leadership of one of its own number more bold or cunning than the others. But with the ripening autumn, when the birds have learned, or think they have learned, all the sights and sounds and dangers of the wilderness, the covey scatters, partly to cover a wider range in feeding, partly in natural revolt at maternal authority, which no bird or animal likes to endure after he has once learned to take care of himself.—W. 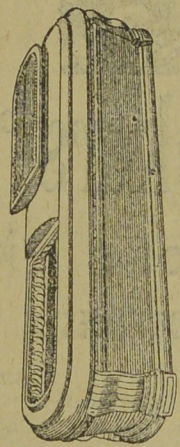
