

LONG DRAWN OUT.

Dr. Fisher Still Under Cross Examination

IN THE PENNIAC QUARANTINE CASE.

Tells About Those Who Were Admitted to Quarantined District.

In the Penniac quarantine case the cross-examination of Dr. Fisher was continued this morning. He would not dispute the authority which says "in all except the more malignant cases the active febrile symptoms rapidly decline during the night of the third day and after some sleep the patient is found on the morning of the fourth day quiet and nearly free from fever and pain with the skin a little moist." The rash usually appears with the disappearance of the constitutional symptoms. About the fifth or sixth day after this the papules become vesicular and on the eighth day they become pustular. There was a marked swelling of the face in the Collings case on the day he diagnosed it, the eyes appeared slightly closed. He did not know that Ernest Collings was prostrated with the disease, nor that his brother Harvey who also had the disease in a very much milder type. The latter had a few spots on the face but they were not so characteristic as those on Ernest. He complained chiefly of the soles of his feet. He took sick a few days after Ernest's case was diagnosed. The witness was not sure that Harvey had or had not been vaccinated. He did not vaccinate him. He did not know whether or not Mrs. Fred Collings was prostrated, saw Oldenburg on a lounge once but could not say that he really was prostrated. It has not been unusual for smallpox patients throughout the province not to be prostrated.

He had seen them working in the fields with the rash on them, and has learned that this has been the case generally in this country and the United States. The recent epidemic in St. John was in winter and prostration was general. Dr. Fisher had had experience in smallpox prior to the St. John epidemic. In Gloucester and Westmorland, the former in the autumn, he thought the latter followed and was towards spring. In Westmorland county he saw a number of patients in bed. There were no complications in any of the Marysville or Penniac cases. There has been no deaths in York county from smallpox recently. Mortality as given by authorities is pretty high generally, but recently the mortality in the United States has not been high. During the recent epidemic in St. John the mortality was about 23 per cent. He would not dispute the authority which says the mortality of the disease ranges from 10 per cent. to 50 per cent. The quarantine was placed, road roped off, etc., about Aug. 5th or 7th, the diagnosis having been made about the 4th. Four houses were within the quarantined district, two of which were quite close together. At the outset there were two day guards within this district, Alfred Barker and F. Estabrooke, jr. Then there were two night guards for all the houses, Duncan and Herman Robinson. The guards were instructed to watch the houses, allow no persons to enter or to leave the houses to mingle with other people, also to allow no persons to go within the rope lines at either end without permission from Dr. Fisher. Mr. Barker reported that on the first day the ropes were up and before the guards had received definite instructions, some milkmen who said they did not understand about the quarantine, had gone partly through, and he permitted them to proceed, conducting them through himself. The witness was not certain that he definitely instructed the guards when the ropes were put up that they were to allow nobody to pass, but he intended such. He was not certain who the parties were now who passed through. He found out at the time from Barker, but as he had conducted them through, and had seen that they had come in contact with no one he thought there could be no danger.

Dr. Fisher directed Barker to allow James Arnold and his boy to pass through a few times and conducted them personally in every instance. Then if one or two members of Arnold's crew had to pass through the quarantine district Mr. Barker was instructed to conduct them to the water edge. He thought Isaiah Chase or his boy was instructed to haul a load of sand through with his team. Witness did not know that they drove through repeatedly. Dr. Fisher personally took a man named Withers in the quarantine district to talk to his wife at a distance. They did not

enter the house. Withers remained with the doctor and talked with his wife from 7 or 8 feet for about ten minutes. Mrs. Withers was not affected with smallpox. Two young men had also passed through without permission. He made enquiries and learned they had come in contact with no one in the quarantined district. He also reported to a member of the Board of Health and they agreed that they should prosecute. There has been no meeting of the board since. There were no other isolations as far as Dr. Fisher knew. Did not know of James Gibson passing through; would swear he had no recollection of being at the rope when Mr. Gibson passed through. Would not swear that everyone got permission that asked. Considered the quarantine was necessary. The ropes shut off a lot of traffic which could conveniently take the other side. If persons passed the lines and had no contact with the inmates of the houses there would be little danger; if the people within were entirely within their houses while parties passed through there would be no danger. On Thursday, Aug. 7th, Dr. McNally visited Mrs. Manzer with him (Dr. Fisher) and examined her. She was then just preceding the disquamation stage. He had telephoned Dr. McNally the day before that he could see the case, that it was Dr. Lunam's wish that he come. He did not make sure of meeting him there and did not care whether he was with him or not. Dr. McNally did not take her temperature.

Adjourned until Tuesday, Sept. 23.

PALMA TROPHY GOES TO ENGLAND.

Americans Second and Canadians Last in the Competition.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—After one of the most exciting contests ever held in Canada, it was known at Rockcliffe rifle range before six o'clock yesterday afternoon, that the British team, captained by Major Hon. T. F. Fremantle, had won the Palma trophy by the narrow margin of 12 points.

The total score of the Britishers was 1,450, the United States being second with a total of 1,447, and the Canadians third with 1,373 points.

Next to the desire of the hundreds present to see the Canadians retain the trophy, the greatest enthusiasm was exhibited over the victory of our British brethren, who crossed the Atlantic.
