ROBBERY AT FLORENCEVILLE

Bank of New Brunswick Looted of Several Thousand Dollars.

Woodstock, N. B., Sept. 14.—News was received this morning of a most serious burglary up river. It appears that last night the building in which the business of the bank of New Brunswick was carried on at East Florenceville was broken into and \$4,000 in cash and securities was stolen. As soon as the fact was discovered Deputy Sheriff Foster was communicated with and he started towards the boundary line in pursuit of the thieves. So far no clue is reported. It is said that two suspicious characters were noticed around East Florenceville yesterday afternoon. The branch of the Bank of New Brunswick was opened at East Florenceville this spring. As the boundary line is only four or five miles away it may be difficult to catch the burglars. Mr. Stewart is agent of the bank.

Houlton, Me.,—The Florenceville branch of the New Brunswick Bank, was broken into and robbed by three professional burglars during last night and \$2,000 was secured. Deputy Sheriff Foster of Carleton County, the officers of the bank and Deputy Sheriff Barnett of Bridgewater started after the men and traced them to Harvey station, 12 miles above here. Word was sent here and officers have gone up the Bangor and Aroostook line in the hope of intercepting them.

BANK CLERK ARRESTED.

Charged with Embezzlement—a Charlottetown Incident.

The Charlottetown, P. E. I. Examiner of Friday says: William G. Cattnach, a clerk of the Bank of British North America, in Halifax, was arrested shortly before 1 o'clock today at the Plant Line wharf by Officers Bradley and Harper, on a charge of embezzlement from the bank in which he had been working.

A telegram was received from Halifax ordering the arrest and stating that Mr. Cattnach was spending a holiday on the Island.

We learn that he came by the Halifax last evening and intended leaving today. He went down to the wharf in the automobile in company with a number of other gentlemen shortly before the boat's time for sailing and as he stepped out Sergeant Bradley made the arrest. Some of the bystanders acted a little hastily and unwisely at the time.

We understand Mr. Cattnach asked to be taken in the company of an officer to Halifax by the boat, but of course this could not be allowed. He was taken quietly to the police station where he will have to remain for further orders. He had some \$27, a watch and a few other articles in his pockets.

ILLNESS.

Sudden Death of Dr. Herbert D. Currie at Cambridge, Mass.

Miss Constance Cecil Marsh.

The news that Miss Constance Cecil Marsh, eldest daughter of Mrs. Kingdon, is dead, will occasion no surprise among those who knew of the critical condition of the young lady for the past few days. The end came peacefully this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The young lady returned with her mother from St. Andrews some weeks ago, ill with a complication of diseases, and although she rallied at times, the physicians more than a week ago concluded that she could not recover. Since then the patient suffered severely, although conscious most of the time until within a few hours of her death. Miss Marsh who was seventeen years of age and a most estimable and popular young lady, had been attending Edgehill School at Windsor, and was taken ill during her vacation.

The deepest sympathy will be felt for His Lordship the Bishop, Mrs. Kingdon, and the members of their family in the sore bereavement that has befallen them.

Dr. H. D. Currie.

Mr. Richardson Boone received a telegram this afternoon from Cambridge, Mass., announcing the sudden death of his son-in-law, Dr. Herbert D. Currie, formerly a well known dentist practising in this city. Mr. Boone had not heard that the Doctor was ill, so the news came to him as a great shock. The remains will arrive here by the noon train Wednesday for burial.

Dr. Currie was a son of the late Thomas Currie, of this city, and a brother of Dr. John Z. Currie, of Cambridge, formerly of this city. He practised here for some years, removing to Cambridge about eight years ago, and had a large circle of friends who will sincerely regret to hear of his death. His wife, formerly Miss Ella Boone daughter of Mr. Richardson Boone of this city, and one son seven years old, survive him.
