LOWER PRINCE WILLIAM.

March, 27.—The freshet reached the highest point ever recorded here last Sunday. The road at Kelly's flat was under water to a depth of nine feet and the new bridge across Garden Creek was damaged to some extent by the ice. The ice jam which is some four miles in extent, has not moved since Sunday and seems likely to remain some days yet.

BEAR ISLAND.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

March 26.—The ice started here last Thursday night and ran about 3 rods, but did not move any more till Sunday when it started again, piling up great hills of ice and logs and crushing everything in its way. The water had been rising all the week and had got to be very high; on Sunday it was two feet higher than was ever known before.

Charles E. Currie had to move out of his house on Friday, as the water had come in and the ice acted as though it intended to follow. Mr. Currie thought if the ice was going to move in he would move out. The water was above the window sills on Sunday, and is in the house yet, although it has fallen some.

The barns on Hog Island, Long Island and Bear Island are gone. The one on Bear Island belonged to Benjamin and Ira Ingraham. It was built 73 years ago and has stood there ever since. Many of the farmers have lost some of their logs and cordwood they had on the bank, although by the ice moving so short a distance at first it gave them time to haul a good many of the logs out, but the cordwood was a hard case.

About all of the fences along the front next the river are gone. The ice broke up in small cakes as far down as William Jordan's; from there to Kelly's Creek there is one solid cake of ice.

Alexander McNally had to move his family on account of the ice and logs being piled up in front of his house, he also moved the hogs out of their house to higher ground. A large cake of ice moved along the flat toward his hog pen in a slow but irresistible manner to within a few feet of the hog pen and then stopped, if it had gone a few feet further it would have crushed it. The bridge there has also moved off, what little travelling there is past there has to be ferried now. The ice is very thick many of the cakes as they lay piled are from 2 to 3 feet thick, it was a grand sight to see the ice moving along on Sunday. There has been much damage done all along the river here, but as the water is falling and the weather cold it looks now as though the ice would remain some time and therefore it will not likely do much more damage.

It has been rather a poor sap season so far and it don't look as though it would be much of a season. There is no snow anywhere about the fields and but very little frost in the ground.

PLEASANT VALLEY.

March 25.—The people of this community was very much startled on Friday morning to hear of the drowning accident at Covered Bridge, of Miss Priscilla MacPherson. She was 38 years old and leaves a grief stricken mother, one brother and two sisters to mourn their great loss. The whole community has sustained a great loss as well as the home she left, and especially the Methodist church at that place, as she was organist and a Sunday school teacher as well. What is their loss is her gain. The funeral took place on Sunday at eleven o'clock. The service was in the church, conducted by the Rev. A. D. McLeod and Rev. Mr. Calhoun. The remains were taken from the house to the church and followed by the mourners and Sunday school teachers and scholars who wore white badges. The church was draped in white and black. Interment was made at the Pleasant Valley cemetery. The floral tributes were beautiful and evidenced the esteem in which the late Miss MacPherson was held.

LETTER FROM REV. MR. COLTER.

Who Has Persuaded Himself that the McLeod Campaign was for Prohibition and Purity.

To the Editor of the Herald:

SIR,—As you were kind enough to call the attention of your readers to my last letter, will you permit me to offer a word of explanation? You deny that prohibitionists have received scant courtesy in your columns. I will apologise for that statement if you will show that in the last three months there has been in editorial paragraph or selected article anything in favor of prohibition. Of course, I do not accept as evidence reports of murders and other crimes that result from the drinking custom of society—customs that I am sure are in direct antagonism to the spirit of him who wrote, "If meat make my brother to offend I will eat no flesh while the world stands." "It is good neither to eat flesh nor to drink wine, nor anything by which thy brother stumbleth or is offended or made weak." Yet in your daily issue for weeks, with scarcely an intermission, there has been something uncomplimentary to prohibition. If you will allow me to consult your file I can prove that such is the case.

As to your statement that the campaign, to which you refer, was one of hypocrisy, what are the facts? One candidate gives prominence to prohibition and electoral purity in all his meetings. After the contest the Herald and Gleaner both having given that candidate a strenuous opposition, agreed that the election was conducted in a very orderly manner, and that it was free from corruption. "Notwithstanding every way whether in pretence or in truth principles that are intimately connected with the safety and prosperity of our country were advocated and at this all good citizens ought to rejoice." Such a boast as the above was never known to be made after an election, during the last fifty years. "Do grapes grow on thorns?"

With me it is a matter of small moment what men, or party are in power in our Legislative halls, if only they may be safely entrusted with the enacting of laws that will make our city a safe place for the bright faced youths, whose voices are heard in our streets, and for the sturdy lads who in field and furrow throughout the land are helping older hands to till the earth, that there may be good for all. It may be too late to help the sodden manhood that throng our saloons and drug stores, but it is not too late for the children, before whom, if we are not faithful in this great work, there may be the awful future of the drunkard, or that "lowly thing, the drunkard's wife."
