ENLARGING THEIR SHOPS

HIS COURSE APPROVED

London, Nov. 25.—John Cathcart Watson, Unionist, who seceded from his party owing to the education bill and sought re-election as an independent Liberal, was elected for Orkney and Shetland by a majority of 400 over the straight Liberal Unionist candidate, who secured only 740 votes.

TRIAL POSTPONED

St. John, Nov. 25.—The trial of Fred Goodspeed as an accessory in the murder of Willie Doherty, which was to have opened in the circuit court today, has been postponed till the next circuit court, after consultation between Hon. H. A. McKeown, crown prosecutor, and Scott E. Merrill, the prisoner's counsel. This course is taken because of the probable appeal to Ottawa in Higgins' case.

DIED IN ITS MOTHER'S ARMS

Moncton, Nov. 25.—A pathetic incident at Forest Glen, Westmorland, occurred yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Stockton with their four-months-old infant, were returning from Graveshill, where they had been spending the day. The child was apparently well and the mother looked occasionally thinking it asleep, but on arriving home found the child dead, having died in its mother's arms. The cause of death is unknown.

GIFT FOR PREMIER ROSS

Toronto, Ont. November 25.—The Mail and Empire (Cons.) announces today that, "in speaking to the Ross Club on Friday Mr. John Flett threw out the remark that Premier Ross would be suitably provided for in his old age, which was enigmatised to all but a few of those present, and by most was taken as meaning that he would accept a senatorship with a portfolio at Ottawa or the lieutenant-governorship.

"From a prominent member of the Legislature, however, it was learned that Mr. Flett was in reality announcing a proposal that is afoot to raise a

large gift fund for Premier Ross, namely \$50,000. This politician stated that a meeting of prominent Liberals from various sections of the province had been held in this city last Wednesday, and that the proposal has been put on a definite basis."

MILLIONS POURING IN

Washington, Nov. 25.—Consul-General Bittinger, reporting to the State Department from Montreal, says that millions of dollars of United States capital have recently been invested in the Dominion in agricultural and timber lands, and mining and manufacturing industries. Canada's internal development in the last few years, he says, has been remarkable. In addition to these investments Consul-General Bittinger adds that many United States syndicates have been looking over the ground in Canada in the last few months.

THE SMALLPOX SCARE

Prompt Measures at Jackman Maine
Will Prevent Spread of the Pest

Bangor, Nov. 25.—Charles E. McKenny who came down last night from Jackman on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, where there are a few cases of smallpox, and which has been closed by quarantine, says that the conditions are not so bad as some people seem to think. At Jackman there were but two cases and every precaution was being taken to prevent the spread of the disease. Further up the line, at Holeb, there is a camp and in it there were four cases. It was from this camp that the two cases at Jackman came. The camp had been quarantined and all the men there had been vaccinated.

At Attean there was a single case and there, as at Holeb and Jackman, all had been vaccinated as a precaution against the spread of the disease.

Mr. McKenny says that he is confident that the prompt measures which have been taken will prove effective and that no serious epidemic of smallpox need be feared.

CHAMBERLAIN'S MISSION.

Colonial Secretary Sets out for South
Africa on a Delicate Errand

London, Nov. 25.—Colonial Secretary Chamberlain and Mrs. Chamberlain sailed for South Africa today. Among those who went to the station to see them off were Premier Balfour, Lord Roberts, and Lord Stratford.

They travelled in a special train to Portsmouth when they boarded the armoured cruiser Good Hope and entertained a party at luncheon before the vessel sailed.

The truth about Mr. Chamberlain's journey to South Africa is that it is an electioneering campaign. He is going out today in defiance of all precedents, to bring about, after direct consultation with the King, a reconciliation of races after the war with the Boers. The situation is grave, but is not desperate. An attempt has been made to smother race hatred with kindness. Peace was made with magnanimity and softness, and by the refusal to suspend the Cape constitution Mr. Chamberlain left the Dutch race in the saddle. He now sets out for South Africa, halting first at Natal, where he is certain to receive a loyal greeting, and going thence to Cape Town, where the next election will be influenced largely by the speeches which he may make and the conferences which he may hold.
