SHOT HIS FRIEND.

James Droughton Then Put Bullet in Brain.

ACCUSED SHELBY, OLD COMRADE OF INSULTING HIS

Whipped out Revolver and Aim Was Deadly.

Newark, N. J., April 17.—Lifelong friends lie side by side in St. Michael's hospital, dying today. One shot the other in resentment of an alleged insult to his wife, then went home and sent a bullet through his brain.

James Shelby, 55 years old, is the man who was shot, and James Droughton is the man who shot him, and then pulled the trigger of his revolver upon himself.

Droughton, who is a machinist, returned yesterday from a long trip in the west. Last evening he entered the saloon of James Murphy, at Central av. and North 3d st., East Newark. He lives at 531 North 3d st., not far from the saloon. Shelby lives at No. 535, on the same street.

When Droughton entered the saloon a dozen men were seated at the tables playing cards. Murphy was behind the bar serving drinks. Shelby stood in front of the bar with a drink before him. When Droughton appeared the men about the tables greeted him with a shout of welcome.

Shelby started to join in the greeting, and stated from the bar toward Droughton who stood shaking hands with the men at the tables. As Shelby advanced Droughton broke off his greetings with the others and moved toward Shelby, at the same time calling him a vile name, and adding:

"I'll teach you to insult my wife," he shouted.

Shelby's hand dropped to his side and he stood still. Droughton flashed out a revolver and fired at point blank distance. The bullet entered Shelby's right eye and took a downward course.

Droughton then turned toward the men who had risen from the tables and commanded them to stand still. They obeyed for his revolver covered them as he retreated to the door. He closed it and ran down the street.

His wife was on the stoop of their home. He said nothing to her, but ran into the house and upstairs. Then, sitting in a rocking chair, he sent a bullet into his brain.

Mrs. Droughton refuses to talk, or to explain her husband's accusation against Shelby. Late last night Shelby recovered consciousness long enough to say: "It is all—a horrible mistake. I never insulted Mrs. Droughton, so help me God."
