RETURNING HEROES.

The Canadians who are expected to reach Halifax next Tuesday from South Africa include the heroes who turned the tide of battle to the British forces on the sanguinary battle field at Hart's River, writing a chapter in the war record no less brilliant than the one penned at Paardeberg. These men in spite of the superiority of the Boers by whom they were suddenly attacked, gallantly faced the enemy and refused to surrender, although their numbers were being rapidly decimated by the Boer fire.

The returning heroes although they reach home after peace has been proclaimed, should not be forgotten by the Canadian people, whose blood tingled with patriotic pride when they read of the deeds performed by our brave sons on the battle field.

At Halifax where the men are to disembark, preparations are already being made to receive them in a manner befitting their glorious record, and while only a limited number of their fellow countrymen will be able to participate in the reception, it is possible for the various cities, towns and hamlets, which sent their quotas to form the contingent, to extend a hearty welcome to the heroes. Fredericton had some representatives in the corps which brought such honor on Canada, and steps should be taken to give these young men a fitting welcome. One of the number, James Tennant, jr., was seriously wounded in the fight, another Bert Finnamore although he escaped wounds, was in the hottest of the fight, and there are others quite as deserving recognition. Let us meet these young men as we greeted the return of the Paardeberg heroes, and show them that their deeds of valor in South Africa have not been forgotten, but are sincerely appreciated by their fellow citizens.

NOTHING NEW.

The Moncton Times quotes with approval some observations of the St. John Globe reflecting on the local government, and apparently derives considerable pleasure from the fact that the St. John paper is renewing its old hostility to Premier Tweedie and his colleagues. The Times has not discovered a mare's nest. The Globe opposed the government in the last general election, and has been knifing it ever since, sometimes attempting the role of a candid friend, but always stabbing when it found opportunity. In spite of the Globe's opposition the government survived the last appeal to the people, winning the greatest political victory ever recorded in this province, and ever since has held the confidence of the legislature and the province, and it will stand, although the Globe is renewing its campaign of opposition. Politicians have long ago ceased to feel uneasiness at any attitude which the Globe may assume, and the Times is wasting space in calling attention to the St. John paper's latest criticism of the government, which is content that it should be fairly judged on its record of successful administration.

A CHANGED MAN.

Close observers of Lord Kitchener since his arrival in England, declare he is a considerably changed man in aspect and demeanor within the past few years; that his brusque manner and conversation has been smoothed out, and that he is more approachable and considerate than the Kitchener of the Soudan.

One writer observes that it is difficult for spectators with memories to identify the hero of the enthusiastic populace

with the stern, unbending avenger of Gordon and the conqueror of the dervishes. The man of iron has become soft and flexible, showing mercy when Mr. Chamberlain and Lord Milner had hardened their hearts, and making peace on most generous terms when there was a reasonable chance of ending what had seemed an irreconcilable race feud. Lord Kitchener carried to South Africa the reputation of being a rough, scientific soldier, who despised sentiment and took a cold and almost heartless view of the business of war. He has brought back an honorable fame as a peacemaker whose chief resource has been magnanimity in triumph. The same Cabinet which had Lord Roberts' word for it that the war was over, and ordered the general election in the midst of the campaign, is now seeking its full share of the popularity of Kitchener's peace, which has excited the admiration and gratitude even of the rancorous pro-Boers.

The North Sydney Herald calls attention to an instance of the curious disparity of sentences imposed on criminals in Sydney. At the recent session of the Supreme court, a man for stealing a watch was sent to Dorchester penitentiary for two years and Saturday a man named Brown, for stopping a neighbor named Malcolm Ferguson, on the highway while journeying from Sydney to his home, and firing three shots at him, one of which took effect in Ferguson's neck, where the ball is still embedded, was sentenced to 20 days jail.

When peace is reigning practically supreme among the nations of the earth, when swords are being beaten into ploughshares, and spears into pruning hooks, when the spirit of the age commands that arbitration shall be substituted for horrid war, it is painful to observe two New Brunswick newspaper managers preparing to get at each other's throats. Libel suits are usually expensive luxuries; they are great things for the lawyers.

The despatches announce that Premier Ross of Ontario, who has been visiting London, has gone to Norway, possibly in an endeavor to forget that conditions are rather threatening at home. If the premier during his trip north can evolve some means by which his government can increase its majority of one in the new legislature, he will be certain to be warmly welcomed by his colleagues and other party associates on his return home.

Although Lord Salisbury has retired from active public life, he leaves several of his immediate relatives engaged in directing the destinies of the British Empire. Mr. Balfour, the new premier, is Salisbury's nephew, a brother of the premier is chief secretary for Ireland, and Lord Cranborne, Salisbury's son and heir, is under secretary in the foreign office and sits in the House of Commons.

The Halifax Herald which is an extreme and unreasonable Tory organ, declares that Sir Wilfred Laurier is merely a figure head in the government, and knows little of what is going on in ministerial circles. The Herald would have more influence if it were less extreme.

Any blame for the indifferent condition of the roads leading out of Fredericton cannot be attributed to the members for the county, nor to the government. The money for repairs is available to the various commissioners and supervisors, and they should see to it that the amounts are expended with despatch and judgment.

From information received since the close of the war, the British authorities believe that the Boers had \$5,000 men in the field at the commencement of hostilities in South Africa.

A London cable says that four, and perhaps six more Rhodes scholarships will come to Canada than was at first anticipated.

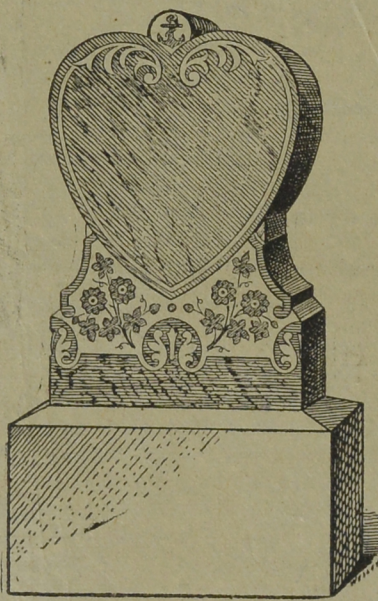
