THE KING'S REMOVAL.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, July 15.—King Edward left Victoria station at 11.35 o'clock this morning for Portsmouth, where he will board the royal yacht Victoria and Albert.

The King was conveyed from Buckingham Palace to the railway station in an ambulance, drawn by two horses.

The only other occupant of the ambulance was Queen Alexandra.

The vehicle was driven at a walking pace, and although there was a crowd at the station there was no demonstration.

Portsmouth, July 15.—King Edward arrived here from London shortly before 2 p. m.

The King bore the journey well, the transfer to the ship was made without mishap and the royal yacht sailed away.

London, July 15.—The specially constructed ambulance in which King Edward is to be removed from Buckingham Palace to the railway station, was taken to the palace yesterday afternoon. Six blue jackets, who have been selected to remove the King, went through a rehearsal by removing the couch on which the King has at times been resting, to the ambulance under the direction of the nurses.

His Majesty, when he is taken from the palace today will be accompanied by Queen Alexandra, Prince and Princess Charles of Denmark, Lord Francis Knollys, the King's private secretary, and the attending physician.

It is understood that no bulletins regarding the king's condition will be issued until his majesty will be safely on board the Victoria and Albert evening.

As the outcome of a petition from south Londoners voicing the disappointment felt at the abandonment of the second day coronation procession, King Edward has consented to a tentative arrangement in accordance with which he will drive through south London in the autumn.

PACE TOO HOT FOR HIM.

PRAISE FOR CANADIANS.

Lord Dundonald Never saw our Soldiers
Turn Their Backs to the Enemy.

Speaking at the Dominion Day banquet, in London, the Earl of Dundonald, Major-General of Canada, said: I was in Natal when it was invaded—a British colony overrun by the enemy. The word ran round the Empire, "A British Colony is invaded," and over the seas they steamed, and they took the part by the side of the Imperial troops, and won our admiration by their conduct. (Cheers.) That is, as regards the past. As regards the future it gives us confidence that the integrity of the British Empire will be maintained in every portion of the globe; no matter whether a small colony is invaded or large Colony, they will come across the seas, for every part of the Empire, to its defence. (Cheers.) I cannot sit down without saying how honored I feel to be going shortly to Canada to command the troops there. (Cheers.) I may say that I have seen the Canadians in action when I never saw them turn their backs. (Cheers.) I never heard a case of giving in, but I heard many cases of those preferring death, even in small pickets, to surrender—(cheers)—and I am proud to command such men as these; armed with the rifle and knowing how to use it, led by officers how to use the material entrusted to their hands, I am sure that should the services of Canada be required—I am certain that if they are required they will be offered—but should those services be required, in time to come, the men will render as good an account of themselves not only in defence of their own country, but in assisting the defence of the Empire in every portion of the globe. (Cheers.)

Meeting With Great Success.

Rev. H. F. Adams who is canvassing the Maritime provinces for the Baptist century fund arrived in the city today from Mangerville Sunbury Co. He has met with great success and already has pledged \$25,000 of the required amount \$50,000. Of this \$12,000 was subscribed in Nova Scotia, \$12,000 in New Brunswick and \$1,000 by six Baptist missionaries in India.

Mr. Adams is more than pleased with the response in this province. At Mangerville, Lakeville Corner and Little River he raised \$200 and Chipman contributed \$325. He has two months more work in New Brunswick.
