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STRANGE INCIDENTS IN LIFE

One Ohio Man, After Wandering 20 Years,

IS LEAD TO HIS MOTHER BY A CHANCE WORD

Another Finds Both Parents Dead.

Upper Sandusky, O., March 15.—Strange incidents in the life history of two young Ohioans have just come to light. The first is the experience of Fred Grenier, a porter at hotel Reher. Grenier was at the depot Saturday when a travelling man overheard his name. The latter asked Grenier if he had relatives at Fremont, O., and was met with a negative answer.

However, the explanation the travelling man gave Grenier so preyed on his mind that he at once investigated. Late Monday he telephoned here that he had found his mother, from whom he had been lost for more than 20 years.

Grenier's story is a peculiar one. He says he was born at Fremont, and 21 years ago wandered away from home to the railroad yards, where he became lost. He boarded a freight train with a stranger and rode to New York city. He was then 5 years old.

The stranger was said to have been a wealthy stockman, who changed Grenier's name to Garner and removed to Chicago. Here the lad was given a splendid education. The lad was also trained to be a jockey, and in this capacity traveled the country over.

Finally he shifted for himself, landing at Findlay, where he married. Although only 5 years old when he was taken from home, Grenier never forgot his name.

The second is similar in some respects, but without the happy termination noted in the above. Twenty years ago Calvin Deplar left here to seek his fortune in the west. He got as far as Illinois, where he located. Nothing was ever heard from him by his parents. Monday he returned to find his parents dead and the estate settled up.

POULTRY TOPICS.

Farmers Wife Makes Defence of the Hen.

(Writer for the Herald.)

There is not a more abused animal on the farm, than the hen, and there is none that will give a large dividend for the care and feed expended, than this same hen.

The average farmer will tell you, there is no money in hens, but he is forced to keep them, for the woman folks cannot get along very well without eggs.

This same farmer gives his other stock the very best of care and feed, while the hen has to be satisfied with the poorest of the grain, chaff, etc., for "anything is good enough for a hen." Perhaps too her sleeping quarters are on the upper girds in a barn where her slumbers are disturbed by the moon and stars peeping through at her. Now a hen is like all other farm stock; neglect her, she is an expense, give her comfortable quarters and feed her well, she will pay her way and give you a profit besides.

To get the largest profits hens should begin to lay in November, and kept laying all through the winter when eggs are

scarce and high. To have eggs in November we must have early pullets, chicks hatched in April or early May, well cared for all summer should begin to lay in the autumn months when the older fowls are moulting.

Some people think it too much trouble to fuss with hens. Well everything is a trouble if we make it so. They have to be fed and watered anyway, why not give a little extra care and have something for our trouble. Do not commence in January to feed for winter eggs, but keep chicks growing well from the shell. In September give extra feed and care and do not relax for a single day. There is danger in feeding too much as too little. With the warm mashies, good whole grain, pure cold water or milk we must mix in a good dash of common sense. Although late, in my next article I will tell how I feed for winter laying. Perhaps others might write their methods and experiences along this line. The Herald (twice a week) is for the farmers, let us make it a medium for helping each other.

One thing I will say here. My love and knowledge of poultry I got from reading "Farm and Home," a farm journal offered with the Herald a year or two ago. LETTER FROM REV. J. J. COLTER

Who Discusses Prohibition—Dr. McLeod's Election, etc.

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir—It is difficult to over estimate the power of the press for good or evil. It has become a necessity of our modern civilization. As an educator it ranks next to the pulpit, while the editor has the advantage of the preacher, in being able to reach a larger number of persons. The reader, too, has this in his power than he can reply if he considers himself aggrieved.

In your columns recently, prohibitionists have received scant courtesy. Will you kindly allow me an opportunity to defend them. There are generally two sides to every question, and truth is never afraid of the light.

At the last general election for York Co., there were those who professed to be working in the interest of prohibition and electoral purity, and although they failed in electing their candidate and were denounced as hypocrites, did they labor in vain? Let their opponents answer. Both daily papers of this city stated that the election was pure. To whom ought we to give the credit of cleansing this Augean stable? Is this the fruit of hypocrisy. They would certainly have received the thanks of Justice Wartel, who in addressing a jury in Montreal a few days ago, said, "Corruption at elections is a grave social disorder and is the canker and disgrace of a free people. Both instigators and instruments of such corruption deserve the contempt of all good and honest citizens, being confessedly injurious to the commonwealth. It is time that the public should determine, irrespective of parties and as a matter of national importance, to energetically put it down."

You have also given publicity to that statement of Dr. Potter, New York's society bishop, that prohibition had been a failure in Maine in preventing drunkenness while it had been very successful in producing hypocrites. Senator Frye and other eminent men have publicly challenged this statement, and denied that there were any such statistics as those by which the bishop pretended to make good his assertion. As an evidence that the statement is not true, they refer to the fact that the law has been in existence about twenty years and neither of the political parties has ever made its repeal a plank in their platform. Neal Dow some years ago said that in two-thirds of Maine no liquor was sold, and the law in Portland is better enforced now, the only dealers being those who carry it concealed in their clothes. A bishop, who was a native of Maine, said he was a young man before he ever saw either a saloon or an intoxicated person. When Maine became a prohibition state she was one of the poorest in the Union, now she takes her place among the rich states.

A professor in the State University of Kansas made the following statement before the Massachusetts Legislature: "Six years previously drunkenness and lawlessness abounded in Kansas. Saloons were everywhere. There were 672 persons in prison. At the time he gave his report it had prohibition, one saloon and only two persons in prison."

A few years ago, according to the report of George Johnson, the Dominion Statistician, in the two-thirds of New Brunswick that had the Scott Act only one-third of its crimes was committed.

Not long since when P. E. Island was under the Scott act, Dominion statistics showed that there was less liquor consumed per head than in any other province in the Dominion.

The enemies of prohibition lay great stress on Principal Grant's utterances against it. His opposition will have very little influence with those who know that the great Presbyterian church of which he is a minister, in its representative assemblies, by an almost unanimous vote, has passed resolutions strongly urging its people to support prohibition. In keen spiritual insight there is a great gulf between him and John Wesley who made all his followers who would obey him, total abstinents. With your permission in a future issue, I will have something more to say on this subject.
