

A E MASSIE LEADS.

A Fredericton Rifleman Highest in the Grand Aggregate at Sussex.

TIED FOR FIRST PLACE IN PRINCE OF WALES MATCH.

And Won Second Place in Association Match.

In the Prince of Wales match at Sussex yesterday, 200 and 500 yards, seven and ten shots respectively, A. E. Massie of this city, tied with Capt. E. A. Smith of St. John for first place. They scored 74 points out of a possible 85. Rev. A. B. Murray of Stanley, put on 71 and won \$5, and R. T. Mack of this city, scored 63 and won a \$2 prize.

The Hazen cup, shot for in connection with the Prince of Wales match, was won by a team from the 8th Hussars.

In the provincial match, 10 shots at 600 yards, Rev. A. B. Murray scored 40 points and won \$5, A. E. Massie won \$4 with 39, and Corp. E. H. Clarkson won \$2 with 36.

In the afternoon an At Home was held by Col. and Mrs. McLean, and Major John H. Parks, who is retiring from the presidency of the association after 24 years of service, was presented with an address and a valuable piece of plate. The presentation was made by the secretary, Major J. T. Hartt.

Colonel Beer, the Honorable Attorney-General Pugsley and Major Arnold made feeling reference to their long acquaintance with Major Parks and their appreciation of his efficient services to the New Brunswick Rifle Association.

Attorney General Pugsley made a short happy speech, in the course of which he stated he had known Maj. Parks for some years, and that, when in January, 1876, Major Parks presented him with what he considered the greatest gift he ever received, his wife, he (the Major) displayed the same good judgment he had always displayed as president of the Rifle Association. The attorney general thought the local government, although they have nothing to do with military affairs, might well encourage rifle associations so that they might continue to improve throughout the province. For himself he was prepared to support any reasonable request that might be presented on behalf of these associations.

Major Parks was heartily cheered when he rose to respond. He said he appreciated the kindness of the association which was far beyond his deserts. During all the time he had been in office he had never experienced any discord. He thought more interest was being taken in the shooting of late years and he saw bright prospects in store for the New Brunswick Rifle Association in the future. He was once more cheered as he took his seat, after again thanking the donors of the valuable gift.

The plate is a sterling silver salver or tray, burnished in the centre and with a beautiful stamped border in a pattern of roses, daisies and shells. It is about 30 inches long by 18 inches wide and of an oval shape. In the centre the following inscription is nicely engraved: "Major John H. Parks, from the members of the New Brunswick Provincial Rifle Association, in grateful appreciation of his services as president, October, 1878, to April, 1902."

A. E. Massie of Fredericton, was leading in the grand aggregate when the shooting closed yesterday.

A telegram from Sussex today says that A. E. Massie won second place in the association match shot this morning, and has first place in the grand aggregate. He put on the possible score at one of the ranges. The matches closed this afternoon.

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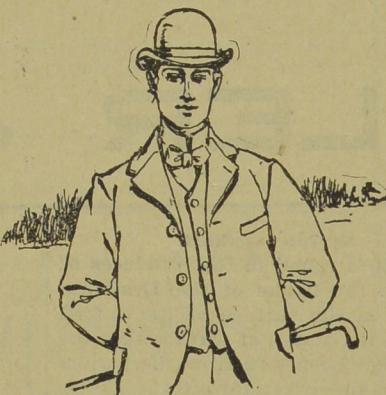
