A meeting of the citizens' committee which had charge of the coronation celebration on August 9th was held in the Mayor's office at the city hall yesterday afternoon. Those present were His Worship the Mayor in the chair and Messrs. C. Fred Chestnut, F. B. Edgcombe, A. D. Thomas, Ald. Farrell, J. W. McCreedy, A. A. Sterling, J. H. Hawthorn, Ald. Stockford, Geo. Y. Dibblee and W. S. Hooper.

The various accounts for expenses incurred in connection with the celebration on August 9th, were handed in by Secretary Hooper and passed. The total expense incurred was found to be \$471.94, made up as follows:

After the accounts had been disposed of Ald. Farrell was voted to the chair, and Sheriff Sterling in a neat speech moved that the thanks of the committee be tendered Mayor Crocket for his services as chairman of the committee. The Sheriff spoke very highly of His Worship, and felt sure, that but for the enthusiasm and diligence displayed by him the celebration would not have been near as successful as it turned out to be. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dibblee, Ald. Stockford and several others.

Ald. Farrell, in putting the motion, expressed himself as greatly pleased with the manner in which the whole celebration had passed off, and agreed with Sheriff Sterling that His Worship deserved a good share of the credit. He also complimented the committee on the manner in which they had kept down the expenditure.

The motion was unanimously adopted and the compliment was acknowledged by the Mayor in a neat speech.

J. W. McCreedy moved, seconded by Mr. Dibblee, that the sum of \$15 be paid to W. S. Hooper in remuneration of the very efficient services rendered by him as secretary to the committee.

Mr. Hooper protested against the passage of this resolution, claiming that he had been actuated by patriotic motives, and neither expected or wanted pay for his services. The committee lent a deaf ear to his protest, however, and passed the resolution.

It was decided to donate the seven medals, purchased for prizes in the water sports, to the Bicycle and Boating Club.

There being no other business to transact, the meeting adjourned.

**THE DOHERTY MURDER.**

**Goodspeed Will Probably Be Indicted  
as Accessary After the Fact.**

Interest in the Doherty murder case, the sensational developments of which have kept public excitement at a high pitch for the past two weeks, will subside now, to revive again on September the second, when the trial will come off before Judge Landry.

So far Frank Higgins is the only one charged by the crown as being connected with the murder. Goodspeed, while kept in equally safe keeping, is only held as a witness. It is not likely, however, that he will altogether escape punishment for his share in the crime.

In spite of his confession by which the crown is enabled to fix the crime in its case upon Higgins, the fact remains that he admits that he was a witness to the

murder and concealed all knowledge of it for ten days, only confessing after he had been arrested. When Higgins makes his statement, if he ever does take the stand, his story may involve Goodspeed more deeply. Judging by his expression during the examination Tuesday night, he will certainly deny part of Goodspeed's evidence, if not the whole.

Whether he does or not, it is probable that Higgins will be indicted before the grand jury as an accessory after the fact. The matter rests entirely with the attorney general, however, and he has not yet given any decision.

Should Goodspeed be so indicted he can still be called upon to testify against Higgins at the trial of the latter. Higgins in his turn can go on the stand at Goodspeed's examination, if he will, but cannot be compelled to do so.

**FREDERICTONIANS AT DAWSON.**

**Interesting Letter From Mrs. Wm. Black, Late of This City.**

A letter from Mrs. Wm. Black to a friend in this city, gives an interesting account of what she has already seen in the Yukon. The letter is dated July 27 and has therefore taken about three weeks in transit.

The party left Vancouver by the large and handsome C. P. R. steamer on July 16, and had a delightful sail to Skagway. Then they took the train on the White Pass and Yukon Railway. From White Horse to Dawson they had a very fast boat which landed them at their destination on the evening of July 21.

Mrs. Black says she found her boys, who have been in the Yukon for some time, both in good health. Her new home is in a log cabin of four rooms, nicely furnished with carpets, curtains, tables, chairs, etc., but she expects to be in a larger house soon. She describes Dawson as a great big town, mostly log cabins, and some very fine ones, and there are some very nice frame houses. The shops are first-class, containing a fine display of dry goods of every kind, groceries of the very best, fruit, all California except blueberries and raspberries, which are native. There are plenty of vegetables, but they cost money—8 lbs. potatoes, \$1; 2 lbs. blueberries, \$1; tomatoes, 75cts. per lb.; 5 cans condensed cream, \$1; prime beefsteak, 65cts. per lb. Clothing and boots are reasonable.

**AN EXCITING CHASE.**

**How a Cheeky Coon Worked a Bluff on  
a Livery Stable Keeper.**

Last evening a colored individual put in an appearance at J. A. Edwards' livery stable, and informed the proprietor that he wished to engage a team for the use of His Worship the Mayor. Mr. Edwards did not like the looks of the fellow, but as the story he told seemed plausible enough, he fitted him out with a horse and an extension top rubber tired buggy and started him off. Still mistrusting that all was not right he waited until the visitor had driven away, and then going to the telephone rang up the mayor's residence and asked if the team had arrived. 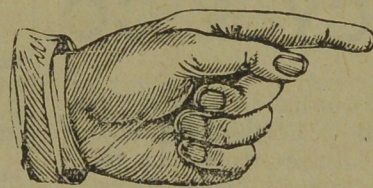
