The gentleman in question was Royal Carroli, of New York, whose steam yacht, with the bridal party on board, is said to have been seen in August 1891 four degrees within the Arctic circle.

The bridegroom then resumed his perch and reins, his wife taking her place on the front garden seat behind him.

In like manner she accompanied him every day for a week, when she settled down to her domestic duties.

TRACADIE AND ITS LAZARETTO.

Interesting Description of This Little Village.

The Educational Review says: A few weeks ago the editor visited Tracadie, in eastern New Brunswick, and noticed some points that may be of interest to the readers of the Review.

The large majority of the inhabitants are French, but speak both English and French, preferring English. This is in direct contrast to the villages of Caraque, not far away, where the French language is spoken almost exclusively.

What gives the stranger a pleasant impression of Tracadie is the fact that everyone whom he meets—man or woman, boy or girl—has a cheery, courteous salutation for him. It seems to be the custom of the place it is given so naturally; and a genial pleasant custom it is, and one worth observing.

The Catholic chapel of the village is a large building capable of holding nearly a thousand people; but what attracts the attention of the visitor is the perfect symmetry of the interior, the lack of which is too often observable in country churches.

The village boasts of two school houses, a new one provided with large well lighted class rooms and a playground, and an old one standing by the roadside. Now the windows of a deserted building standing by the roadside are too often the target for the small bad boy with a stone. But here not a pane of glass was broken, which spoke volumes for the breeding of the Tracadie boys.

The country here, like all the east of New Brunswick, is level, with Farms Fairly Well Cultivated.

extending but a short distance back from the shores of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The women were working in the harvest fields with the men, their heads covered with bright colored scarfs. This custom of women helping to gather the harvest and level farms, reminds one of the fields of Normandy.

The greatest object of interest at Tracadie, is the Lazaretto. Many years ago a ship from the Levant appeared in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, some of the sailors sick with that terrible scourge, leprosy. The disease was unknown to the people, and the sailors were brought ashore and nursed, but after a time many of the inhabitants were afflicted. Measures were then taken to prevent its spread. But some were hidden by their friends. About 40 wretched captives were placed on an island in the Miramichi, where they

than human beings. People fed at their approach. Food was taken to them in boats and thrown upon the shore, as if to dogs. The Government built a lazaretto at Tracadie and their condition was improved. Now there is a handsome building erected and maintained by the Dominion Government. Their every want is attended to by the faithful Sisters of Charity, and their condition is made as cheerful and happy as possible. They number now only eighteen. Under the medical supervision of Dr. A. C. Smith, whose reputation as an authority on leprosy, is world-wide, there is a prospect that the disease may be stamped out after a generation or two. The sources of fresh contagion from abroad (there are three Icelanders in the Lazaretto now, who came to this country afflicted with the disease some years ago), and the hiding of diseased ones by their friends, are the two sources of danger at present; but the latter causes little anxiety, owing to the watchfulness of the authorities and the care bestowed upon the unfortunates in the Lazaretto. This has gained the confidence of the people.

CABLED HAPPENINGS IN FOREIGN LANDS.

Two Mourning Parties Followed Wrong Coffin.—Steel Combine in South Europe.

A statue to Balzac was unveiled at Paris on Sunday.

While six of the wealthiest residents of Brescia were fishing in Lake Como, Switzerland, their boat was overturned and all were drowned.

A company has been formed in Paris, with a directorate including eminent society people, for the purpose of carrying on a hotel for women.

A Scottish nobleman whose name had been given as Hope, became insane at Turin while travelling to Brindisi, but his exact identity has not yet been established.

Two funeral services were being held at the same time in the Belleville Church at Paris, and when the two parties of mourners arrived at the cemetery it was found that each had followed the wrong coffin.

The Austrian and Bulgarian iron and steel industries have succeeded in forming a gigantic combination, or cartel, comprising twenty-three separate establishments, with an aggregate capital of \$70,000,000.

The Novoe Vremya, the chief journal of St. Petersburg, publishes a long lamentation over Russia's failure to take proper advantage of the British embargo in South Africa to secure greater advantages in the far East.

An international congress on earthquakes is to be held in 1903, and it is proposed to form an international seismological association, which will, perhaps, be a section of the newly formed International Association of Academies.

At Tours, France, on Saturday, military officers hissed an anti-military song in a theatre, and the crowd attacked them and severely handled them. The fight was followed by an anti-military demonstration which developed into a serious riot.

In the hope that gaming palaces will relieve the poverty which prevails on the island, Corfu has contracted with a syndicate of European capitalists to allow of the establishment of a gambling casino on a grand scale within its borders.

A French scientist announces that he has succeeded in fermenting without the presence of alcohol, and it is hoped the difficulty of providing a satisfactory temperance drink has at last been solved, by a series of new drinks, every wine, beer, and spirit now used being provided with a non-alcoholic understudy.
