

C. P. R. EXPRESS

On the Intercolonial Railway
Jumped the Rails.ENGINEER TRIDER AND FOUR PASSENGERS
REPORTED KILLED AND SEVEN
PERSONS INJURED.Wires are Down and Details of Accident
are Meagre.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Halifax, Dec. 6.—The C. P. R. express
was derailed near Belmont this morning.Four passengers were killed and seven
injured.Engineer Sam Trider, one of the veter-
ans of the road, is among the killed.[Belmont is the second station this side
of Truro, and is eight miles from that town.
The dead Engineer, Sam Trider, has been
running an engine on the I. C. R. ever
since the road was opened thirty years
ago, and was one of the most trustworthy
and popular men on the railway.]

Particulars Hard to Obtain.

Halifax, Dec. 6.—The C. P. R. from the
east, No. 25, was derailed at Belmont this
morning.From particulars that can be gleaned
here it is known that Engineer Sam
Trider, of Moncton, and four passengers
were killed and seven passengers injured.No particulars are available owing to
damage to the wires by the storm.Trider was 55 years of age, and has
been on the road for 30 years. He was
in several accidents, among them being
the Palmer Pond accident near Dor-
chester, some years ago, when his engine
stayed on the rails while the whole train
plunged down an embankment.He was the driver of the first train at
the opening of the I. C. R. between
Moncton and Truro, thirty years ago
Nov. 11th. He leaves a wife and five
children. Names of the passengers killed
cannot be obtained yet. Harry Camp-
bell was the fireman.Fireman Campbell is supposed to have
escaped. Four cars were damaged, one
gentlemen, two ladies and a child, passen-
gers, were killed.

BOY'S TERRIBLE DEATH.

Companions Haze Him by Distending His
Body With Compressed Air—Five
Arrests Made.

Paterson, N. J., Dec. 6.—Harry Ruit, a
thirteen year old lad employed as a
riveter's helper at the American Loco-
motive Works in South Paterson, met
with a horrible death early this morning,
as the result of a prank played on him by
some youthful companions. These five in
number are now held without bail on a
charge of homicide, and all but one,
Dorn deny the charge.The lad, who was a new employee, was
hazed, or as the young fellows about the
shops call it, "initiated." Air was forced
into his body by means of a compressed-
air tube until he swelled to a point that,
with screams of agony, alarmed the
practical jokers, who finally summoned
the police and an ambulance. The vic-
tim was taken to the hospital, where he
lingered for a couple of hours, and re-
gaining consciousness before death came,
made an ante-mortem statement.When the boys were brought into the
Recorder's court this morning Ruit's
father rushed at Dorn knocked him down
and attempted to further attack him, but
was restrained by the court attendants.
Dorn's mother was present, and became
hysterical.The autopsy on the body of young Ruit
showed that death resulted from ruptures
of the intestines and inflation of the
organs due to the enormous pressure they
were subjected to.

A DRY MAINE TOWN.

Ellsworth, Me., Dec. 6.—Friday, the
day on which liquor dealers of Hancock
county ceased illegal selling, owing
to the edict issued by Sheriff Whit-
comb, was an unusually quiet one
in Ellsworth, greatly in contrast to the
day previous, which was of much ac-
tivity [when the selling of liquor (con-
tinued during the entire day and far
into the night. The dealers held a sort
of bargain sale, in order to dispose of
their goods, selling at half rates. The
principal excitement of Friday was the
moving of one or two dealers with the
intention of going out of business en-
tirely.With the banishment of liquor from
the saloons and drug stores, the question
has arisen, as to how those who need
wines or liquors for medicinal purposes
will be supplied, and the sentiment now
appears to be in favor of a State agency,
similar to those of other cities where the
prohibition law is enforced.Already drummers who frequent El-
lsworth in their travels are speaking of the
city as a "dry town," and some were
shaking the dust or snow of the place off
their feet as quickly as possible in their
eagerness to leave it Friday.

REFERENDUM VOTE.

Full Returns are Not Yet
Available.BUT IT IS ABSOLUTELY CERTAIN THAT
THE LAW IS DEFEATED.

Prohibition Majority Will be 60,000.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—Returns of the refer-
endum are coming in very slowly. Most
of the northern districts are yet to be
heard from, and it will probably require
official declarations to give anything like
a reliable total of the vote cast for and
against the act.It is now absolutely certain, however,
that the necessary majority to call the
act into force will not be obtained.At prohibition headquarters it is anti-
cipated that the vote for prohibition will
exceed 160,000, with a majority of some-
what over 60,000 for the act.The figures of the latest returns avail-
able show 128,850 votes for the act and
76,469 against. This gives a majority at
present of 52,346, so that the claim of the
prohibition leaders that the majority will
be over 60,000, seems to be a very reason-
able one.

A SENSIBLE CONCLUSION
