FOUND IN WASTE BASKET.

Lincoln's Pathetic Tribute to a Mother of Five Sons Killed in the War.

New York, March 7.—Soiled and faded, torn and frayed, a letter written by Abraham Lincoln a few months before his assassination, has been found in some rubbish and papers on Broadway, near the post-office.

It read as follows:—
"Executive Mansion, Washington, D.C., Nov. 21, 1864.

"To Mrs. Bixby, Boston, Mass.
"I have been shown in the files of the War Department a statement of the adjutant-general of Massachusetts that you are the mother of five sons who have died gloriously on the field of battle.

"I feel how weak and fruitless must be any word of mine which should attempt to beguile you from the grief of a loss so overwhelming. But I cannot refrain from tendering you the consolation that may be found in the thanks of the Republic they died to save.

"I pray that our Heavenly Father may assuage the anguish of your bereavement, and leave you only the cherished memory of the loved and lost and the solemn pride that must be yours to have laid so costly a sacrifice upon the altar of freedom.

"Yours very sincerely and respectfully,
"A. Lincoln."

Premier of South Australia.

Mr. John Greely Jenkins, the new Premier of South Australia, is by descent a Welshman, but was born in the United States, at Clifford, Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania. He arrived in Adelaide in 1878. Having held various municipal offices at Unley, South Australia, Mr. Jenkins was elected to the Legislative Assembly in 1887, and was re-elected in 1890. In March, 1891, on the death of Mr. Bews, Mr. Jenkins accepted the portfolio of Minister of Education in the Playford Ministry, exchanging it in January, 1892, for that of Public Works, a position he held till June, 1892, when he resigned with his colleagues after their defeat. He held office in the Kingston Ministry and was subsequently Chief Secretary in the Holden Ministry. On Mr. Holder's retiring from State politics to enter the Federal Parliament Mr. Jenkins succeeded him in the Premiership.

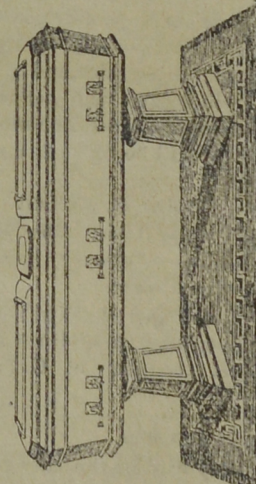
