THE SPORTSMEN'S SHOW.

New Brunswick Exhibit Attracts Great Attention.

MESSRS. EDGECOMBE AND CHESTNUT WERE INDEFATIGABLE IN EFFORTS

To Set the Claims of Fredericton Before Intending Tourists.

PARTY FROM THIS CITY RECEIVED BY MR. SANBORN.

Boston, March 3.—The Massachusetts Sportsmen's Show is now in full swing and is attracting thousands of visitors who gaze in wonder upon the live game animals and birds, the mounted specimens, the primitive log cabins, and the other attractive features which go to make up the most remarkable and complete aggregation of the kind ever seen beneath one roof in America. The show is being held on the Mechanics' fair building, located on Huntington Avenue within a block of Copley Square. The building is admirably adapted for a Sportsmen's Show, and the various exhibits are arranged in a manner which at once appeals to the practiced eye of the sportsman and awakens within him memories of happy days spent with gun, rod or rifle in search of some member of the game family. There are no less than five log cabins scattered about the building, and there are herds of deer, elk, antelope, and buffalo in separate wire enclosures, bevys of ual, partridge and pheasant; flocks of ducks, geese and brants, cages of mountain lions, bears, wolves, coons, badgers, foxes, beavers and squirrels; and in addition to all this there are mounted specimens of nearly every kind of game found on the continent.

The live bird collection is a splendid one, and includes in addition to the many varieties of ducks and geese occupying the duck pond, Mongolian pheasants, Hungarian partridges, French partridges, Virginia quail, Armenian partridges, English partridges and our own partridges or ruffed grouse. There are about thirty of the latter and they appear to thrive in captivity, though a partridge has been found a hard bird to domesticate, and this is the first time they were ever exhibited at a Sportsman's show. They are fed on apple tree twigs and spend the greater part of the time perched on the limbs of small spruce trees set up within the wire enclosure.

So far as the display of live animals is concerned, the show is not up to that held in Chicago a year ago, but in most other respects it is superior to it. The artificial duck pond has about 150 web footed occupants, including wild geese, brant and every variety of ducks. The geese's honk and the ducks keep up a constant quacking and amuse themselves racing around the pond.

A large aquarium erected near the centre of the building, contains in addition to several varieties of trout, perch, pike, etc. a collection of tropical fish, mostly from the West Indies. These are kept in tanks of salt water and make a most interesting sight. They are of all shapes and colors, and don't look as if they would make very good eating even during the Lenten season. Down in the bottom of one of the tanks containing the fancy colored fish, is a solitary, sleepy looking lobster, also from tropical waters. It is blue in color, but in other respects does not differ from the ordinary, every day lobster of commerce.

The most interesting exhibit in the building to a great many is a large collection of antique fire arms shown by the United States Cartridge Company. This collection is made up of over seven hundred different rifles, guns and pistols and is valued at \$30,000. All are of patterns long since superannuated, and the list includes everything, from the old bow gun of medieval times to the breech loader of about fifty years ago. Near the fire-arm exhibit is shown a very rare collection of relics of the revolutionary and civil wars, among which is part of a tree found on the battlefield of Chancellorsville, with bullets and scraps of shells protruding therefrom. The spirit of '76 is exemplified in

a collection of military hats of colonial days, and a unique assortment of ladies' sun bonnets of the same period are shown along with the other relics.

The New Brunswick booth is one of the most attractive features of the show, and the exhibit is beyond a doubt the best of the kind in the building. The log cabin, with its birch bark roof, looms up splendidly and is the most popular resort for sportsmen in the building. The exhibit is in charge of Chief Game Commissioner Knight, who has competent assistants in R. H. Armstrong and Game Overseer Robinson of Newcastle and Walter Carnall, the well known St. John taxidermist. The delegation of New Brunswick guides who make their headquarters at the New Brunswick booth is composed of W. H. Allen, of Penniac, Arthur Pringle of Stanley, Adam Moore and Charles Cremins of Scotch Lake, Major John E. Sanson of Stanley and James Ryder, a mighty hunter from Canaan, Queens County. James Beaulin and Come Viollette, guides from Madawaska County are also here, having made the trip at the expense of a Boston sportsman, whom they had out hunting last fall. Mr. Ryder seems to possess an extraordinary fund of information, and is kept very busy answering the questions of curious visitors. He shows a splendid collection of native furs which elicit flattering comments from all who see them.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has an attractive exhibit in charge of Mr. H. J. Calvin, the Boston representative of the road. It consists of a large cabin made of cedar logs and a collection of mounted game specimens, some of which were loaned by Surveyor General Dunn. The Canadian Pacific was also represented at the Sportsmen's Show lately held in Chicago, and will likely have an exhibit at New York.

Messrs. Fred B. Edgcombe and C. Fred Chestnut, who have been here since the commencement of the show in the interests of the Fredericton Tourist Association, are leaving for home this evening. Both gentlemen have been in constant attendance at the New Brunswick booth, and if every frequenter of summer resorts in this vicinity does not pay the celestial city a visit next season, it will be no fault of theirs. Messrs. Edgcombe and Chestnut have made many important additions to their list of friends while here, and their early departure for home is generally regretted by the show managers.

The Fredericton Tourist Booklet is by long odds the most attractive publication in the way of advertising literature being distributed at the show, and is in great demand among the visitors. The St. John Tourist Association is also distributing a booklet here, but it is a cheaper affair and not much sought after.

On Monday morning Messrs Edgcombe, Chestnut, Adam Moore, J. W. McCready (who arrived from Fredericton on Sunday) and the writer paid a visit to the mammoth establishment of Chase & Sanborn, the well known coffee manufacturers. They received a most cordial greeting from Mr. J. S. Sanborn, one of the firm, who lately visited Fredericton, and were by his instructions, shown over the premises. The firm are the owners of immense coffee plantations at Porto Rica, and handle about seventeen million pounds of coffee a year, in addition to a large quantity of teas. The coffee is brought from the plantation in its raw state and is cleaned, roasted and made ready for shipment at the firm's factories in this city and Chicago. The Fredericton contingent spent an hour going through the store, in the company of Mr. Briggs of the office staff, who explained to them the method of manufacture. Afterwards they met Mr. Sanborn in his private office and had a pleasant chat with him on matters pertaining to New Brunswick. On leaving he shook hands pleasantly with all hands and promised to visit the New Brunswick exhibit at the Sportsmen's Show.

General Manager Dimick is very anxious to have a New Brunswick day at the Sportsmen's Show, and is hopeful of being able to induce Premier Tweedie and Surveyor General Dunn to visit here some day next week and take part in the proceedings. He recognizes the fact that the Legislature being in session makes it rather difficult for the members of the government to attend, but thinks that the difficulty can be got over some way.

LETTER FROM JAMAICA.

Chance for New Brunswick Farmers to Open New Trade.

The Board of Trade is in receipt of the following letter from Mr. W. Simpson MacCormack, a fruit and produce dealer and commission agent of Kingston, Jamaica. As the letter may interest some of our enterprising farmers and lead to trade with this colony, it is given in full.

Kingston, Jamaica,
Feb. 18th, 1902.

Secretary Board of Trade, Fredericton,
N. B.:

Dear Sir,—As you are no doubt aware, a direct Canadian-Jamaica S. S. line has been recently established between St. John, N. B., and this port. With the sailings of the steamers tri-weekly as is contemplated I could take from 50 to 70 head each trip of heavy sheep, rams and ewes. I use the term "heavy" advisedly, as the shipping weight of the exported sheep should not be less than 130 lbs. each and upwards. I mention 130 lbs. as the

minimum, but the stock cannot be too heavy, in fact the heavier the more acceptable. Delivery to be made on a F. O. B. basis at St. John. I am not particular as to the proportion of rams and ewes supplied.

I have thought it advisable to inform you fully as above, so as to avoid delay in parties communicating with me, who you may be pleased to place me in correspondence with, which is the object of this communication.

It may be necessary for me to further say that the object of this is also to deal direct with first hands, as I have been doing with deliveries at other points in Canada.

Thanking you in anticipation of any trouble I may give you, and hoping to hear from you by return via New York.
