

MR. TARTE AT BERLIN.

The Minister Defends His Recent Course.

PROPOSES TO CONTINUE IT AND STAND BY HIS UTTERANCES.

Speaking at the Board of Trade banquet at Berlin-Ontario, Friday night Mr. Tarte after quoting an extract from Mr. Fielding's budget speech of last year, which he quoted at Orilla, and continued:—"I want to ask my Liberal friends whether I have been untrue to my leader and to my party, because I have advocated the change of the tariff which the Finance Minister himself had announced. The reason that the revision did not take place last year was that we were to have a colonial convention in London. The meeting has taken place, the Minister of Finance is back. I have no right to say that a revision of the tariff will take place or not; the Government has not met yet; but I have a right to remind the country that in taking the stand I have taken, I have only followed out the policy we announced to the country last year? Mr. Tarte cordially congratulated Berlin upon the establishment of the sugar factory. He mentioned the pulp industry as one in which the Government should take action to offset the action of the American Government. There were dozens, perhaps hundreds, of items in which a readjustment should be made.

Mr. Tarte continued: "Two or three newspapers have criticized me very severely. The one that has criticized me, perhaps, with most energy is my friend The Globe, from Toronto. It is a great newspaper; we all read it; we are not obliged to believe every word that it writes, but all the same we read it, and read it carefully and cheerfully. I found out the other day an article from The Globe I would like them to reproduce, if they would be kind enough to do so. They have changed their mind lately. There was a day when The Globe said, very fairly, very eloquently, that it was time for all Canadians to have a policy for themselves."

Mr. Tarte then read an article of March 24, 1897, in support of his contention.

"Well, now, did I ever say anything more than Mr. Globe then said? And sir, I have been excommunicated high and fast by my friend from The Globe because I contend today, that the time has come for this country to have a policy of its own to suit our own purposes. (Cheers)

"I am sorry I am in such a bad state tonight. I have spoken too much in the last month or so. I do not regret a word I have said. I intend to stand by every utterance. I have not gone beyond the right or duty of a Minister. I am sorry to have been assailed by some of my political friends. I do not believe I deserve that treatment at their hands. I have given them ten years of loyal service. Perhaps these services in the past have not been altogether wasted. The Liberal party had been long out of office. They came into office because public opinion changed. I may say frankly that I did my best to bring about a change in public opinion. I am not here to regret what I have done. I have given twenty years, perhaps the best of my life, to the Conservative party. I am proud of it. I followed a man who will pass to history as one of the greatest men who have ever come in any country, Sir John Macdonald. (Cheers). I have followed loyalty and manfully another great man, Sir Wilfrid Laurier—(cheers)—but I am not going to be put down in the way that some of my friends have tried to do it. I do not believe that official life has enough charms for me that I will renounce principles—ideals that I think of national importance—for the sake of office, and I feel that I have advocated and followed a policy which was announced last year to the whole country by the Minister of Finance. If in my utterances I have been imprudent, I am fully prepared to take all the consequences of my imprudence. I feel that I have only advocated a policy that the country is prepared to stand by, the development of our transportation facilities, the revision of the tariff from a Canadian and a British standpoint. Let us trade together and build a nation here. Unless

I can read no more the signs of the times, 90 per cent of the public sentiment of this country share your views, Mr. Chairman, and my views."

MAINE'S VETERAN HUNTER.

The town of Bingham, Maine, is the home of Nathan B. Moore, undoubtedly the oldest guide in Maine. Mr. Moore is eighty-four years of age, erect of figure, and still able to stand his share of a tramp through the woods. He estimates his record of big game killed at 276 moose, 200 caribou, 100 bear and many deer. At eight years of age he began trapping, and he has followed it every season since.

"My father," he says, "was the ferryman at the time, and he gave me two small steel traps which I set near the ferry at a point where muskrats and mink were plenty, and this, my first effort, met with good success. I was so small that I could not spring the trap alone, and I had to take the animals caught to my father, who removed them and reset the traps. The money secured from those skins was the first I ever earned. Before long, however, I was able to look after the traps myself, and from that time on I took many fur-bearing animals each season. As I became older I had a gun and hunted small game and killed many partridges, which were eaten on our table.

"At fourteen years of age I killed my first moose, a large bull, and soon after that my career as a trapper and hunter began, and I have devoted most of my time to it since.

"When I started out in life I determined that I would always tell the truth, never drink spirits, or use tobacco.

"Moose and caribou were very plentiful about here in those days and I killed many of them, taking the meat down the river and selling it, often realizing \$100 for a moose and nearly as much for a caribou, besides having the hides, tallow and shanks left for my own use.

"I ran down on snowshoes most of the 276 moose I killed, and I think that I must have found some of the smartest moose in the woods in the number, but I never yet found one that I could not catch the first time I started him in the morning under favorable conditions, and without the help of either man or dog. Some would run five, some ten and a few twenty miles, but I was always sure of them sooner or later."

WOMEN WORSE THAN THE MEN.

New York, Oct. 12.—Lady Henry Somerset, president of the World's Woman's Christian Temperance union, is ashamed of England because it is a nation of drunkards and because the woman drunkards outnumber the men three to one. Lady Somerset did not hesitate to express herself freely upon the situation. "Drunkenness is on the increase in England," said Lady Henry, "I am really ashamed to tell the American people in what a deplorable state the United Kingdom is. It has become a nation of drunkards. It seems hopeless to work for its reformation. The increase in intoxication at home is due to the spread of the drink disease among women. "To illustrate to you how women abroad have taken to drink, I want to say that about fifteen years ago the average arrests in London for intoxication was four men to one woman. Now it is three women to one man.

"Why is it? Well, one of the chief reasons is that there has been too much privacy put about public houses of late and women are now able to go to any of them without being seen by the public.

"The increase in drink among women has naturally made a great increase in

crime. The reason is apparent. Women are more excitable, sensitive, and nervous in drink than men, and in this condition will commit crime more readily. The school bill that was passed, prohibiting the sale of liquor to children under fourteen years has stopped drunkenness to some extent, but not enough to count.

"There is one thing I will say about England, notwithstanding the fact that she is in the grasp of the brewer and the liquor interested politician, she is doing everything she can to prevent the necessity of sending drunken women to prison. She is trying the open air cure on them.

"We have near Surrey a large farm, to which are sent those women whose drinking habits have gotten them into disrepute, but for whom there is hope of reformation. They are sent into the gardens with the sunlight and the fresh air, and when we think they are reformed we send them back to their families. There is no prison disgrace about this.

"We had a royal commission to England to study the cause for the increase in the use of intoxicants and the attendant increase in crime. This commission sat three years and examined thousands of witnesses, including myself. It had for its chairman Lord Peel, a good and honest man, who, with some others, was always at variance with the other members of the commission.

"Lord Peel and one or two others made the minority report. Their recommendations were straight from the shoulder and opened the eyes of the crown, but the majority report carried the day, and shall I tell you why? Twenty out of the twenty-five members of the commission were brewers, brewers' sons, owners of brewers' lands, or other paid social assassins. They were placed on that commission for the purpose of preventing an honest report, and their work is seen today in the thousands of desolated homes in every part of the kingdom.

"I would rather have the soul of the worst drunkard in the world than the soul of any of those men.

"As for the army canteen, it is a political scheme. The army is better without the canteen. Those who say that the canteen is better within the ranks have an axe to grind.

"There is one thing that gives me great grief on this trip," said Lady Henry, as her face grew sad. "I miss Frances Willard. She always met me at the pier when I came here. Now she is gone."

Lady Somerset, when asked about Carrie Nation, said she hoped she was not compared with her in the public mind.

FORCES BIBLE OUT OF SCHOOLS.

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 11.—The State Supreme court handed down a decision

forbidding the reading in the public schools of the Bible or the singing of such hymns as "Nearer, My God, to Thee." The decision is:

"Exercises by a teacher in a public school, in a public building, in school hours, and in the presence of the pupils, consisting of the reading of passages from the Bible and in the singing of songs and hymns and offering prayer to the Deity in accordance with the doctrines, beliefs, customs or usages of sectarian Churches religious organizations, is forbidden by the Constitution of the State."

The action was one brought by Daniel Freeman, an atheist; who holds the honour of being the first homesteader in the United States.

Freeman maintained that the King James Bible was not a correct translation of the Scriptures, but was a version specially made for the Church of England; that it contained much that was unfit to be read aloud, and being part of the Christian religion, was therefore sectarian.
