CRIME AND CRIMINALS.

Ever since the discovery of the Doherty murder there has been much discussion in St. John as to the best means of stamping out juvenile crime, and many plans have been proposed but none have yet been put into effect. The clergymen have met and separated without formulating anything practical on the subject, the pulpits have thundered, the press has followed suit and General Booth has spoken, but there is no united promising effort to break up combinations like the tan yard gang and free St. John from the terrorism of the youthful burglars and thugs who flourish in that city.

In this connection an extract from the address of Mr. Scott, superintendent of the Massachusetts Reformatory, delivered at the recent meeting of the Prison Reform Association of the United States at Philadelphia, will be of interest. "A 'tough' boy is the easiest to reform. You must have something to work on, as conscience, pride, love of parents, sisters, regard for friends, fear of God and the future. There must be a feeling or sentiment that can be awakened.

"There is hope for the impetuous, reckless young 'tough,' and little or none for the wishy-washy, whining sneak thief who is swayed by every new companion he meets, lost to all sense of honor by the smile of some dissolute creature wanting a ribbon or a handful of jewellery. A man without character, force, ambition or pride is almost helpless.

"To prevent crime we must begin in the public school, weed out the bad boys, separate them from the others, put them in special classes with specially trained teachers to look after them. Our schools are radically defective in this respect. A few bad boys of fascinating, dominant natures will corrupt many lads who are amiable and of good dispositions. Our public schools should not only train pupils mentally and morally, but industrially. Love of work is the basis of right living. Industry is the salvation of the race. A boy taught to work and to love work seldom goes to prison. In industry you will find virtue.

"I have a friend, a man well known in this country, who did not want his boy to suffer the hardships he had endured, so he sent him to school. The lad ran away. He put him in a boarding school. Again he ran away. Finally he got him into the navy. He deserted. After much difficulty he got his boy back home and had a heart to heart talk with him.

"To his great surprise, this distinguished gentleman, an authority on human affairs, discovered that his boy wanted to work. So he allowed him to learn a trade. The boy immediately changed. He has been happy since, never giving employer or parents the least trouble."

SIR JOHN BOURINOT.

In the death of Sir John Bourinot, Clerk of the House of Commons, which occurred at his home in Ottawa, Wednesday evening after a lingering illness, Canada has lost one of her most gifted sons. The deceased gentleman was a native of Sydney, Nova Scotia, where he was born on October 27th, 1837, and was therefore in his 65th year. His father as the Hon. John Bourinot, senator, and his grandfather a Supreme Court judge of Nova Scotia.

Before becoming clerk of the house Sir John was connected with the newspaper profession and was parliamentary reporter for a time. He established the Halifax Reporter in 1860 and was its chief editor for years.

Sir John was an author and lecturer, chiefly on historical subjects, and was recognized as the greatest authority on parliamentary procedure in the Dominion. He was a warm advocate of Imperial federation and a leading member of the Royal Society of Canada.

As clerk of the house of commons he was popular with the members and as a citizen of Ottawa he was highly respected and greatly esteemed by a wide circle of friends. It should also be said that as official head of the staff of the house he was liked by all.

Sir John enjoyed great popularity as a lecturer and has been heard from nearly every platform in the country. Several years ago he visited Fredericton and delivered a lecture in the library of the University, which was greatly enjoyed. As a man of letters, his reputation extended throughout the empire.

The Irish landlords have decided by 77 votes to 14 against a compromise with the tenants. This majority causes some surprise. The London Daily Chronicle says that the landlords have again acted in accordance with their worst traditions, and have again diminished the fast vanishing sympathy of this country with them in their misfortunes.

A British blue book issued by the war office says that the total number of horses purchased in Canada for use of the army in South Africa was 12,098, the contract prices being cobs \$125, cavalry \$140, artillery \$150. These prices included delivery at Montreal.

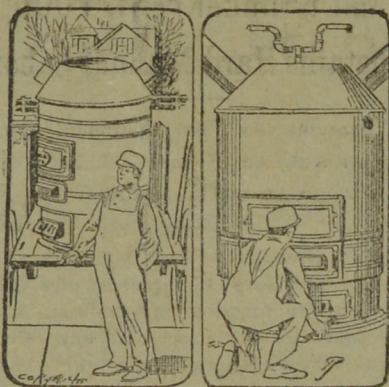
