Moncton, Oct. 14.—Rev. S. C. Moore a well known Baptist clergyman and a leading Orangeman died suddenly at Edgetts landing Sunday morning, aged 70 years.

A BATTLE PENDING.

LAURIER'S HOME COMING.

Montreal, Oct. 14.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will make his first public declaration in reply to the civic address to be presented at Quebec on his arrival Thursday evening. The press reporters will not be allowed to board the steamer Lake Erie at Rimouski, or to go down river in the government steamer Druid, which will leave Quebec Thursday to meet the Lake Erie.

Quebec, Oct. 14.—Preparations are being made to give Sir Wilfrid Laurier a rousing reception on his arrival here Thursday evening. As soon as the steamer arrives a big street procession will be formed. Illuminations and decorations are now going up all over the city, and the day promises to be a memorable one for Quebec Liberals.

FIRE AT HILLSBORO.

Four Dwelling Houses go up in Smoke.

Moncton, Oct. 14.—At midnight a fire broke out in the old post office at Hillsboro, occupied by Wm. Stevens, general store keeper, and two families living upstairs.

The seven occupants of the house escaped in their night clothes.

The fire spread and destroyed the residence occupied by R. L. Blake owned by Graham G. Steeves, crossing Academy street, and burning the residence of Mrs. John Thistle, occupied by H. Zelig. Four buildings in all were consumed.

Chief Justice to Retire.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—The general impression that Chief Justice Sir Samuel Henry Strong will retire from the Supreme Court bench after the 20th inst., upon which date he will probably deliver judgment upon the appeals which have been heard.

Sir Henri Elzear Taschereau will succeed him as Chief Justice, but it is not known who will be appointed to the vacancy caused by Chief Justice

Strong's retirement, although the name of Mr. Justice Armour has been mentioned.

GENERAL BOOTH AT ST. JOHN.

The Great Reformer Addresses a Monster Meeting at St. Andrew's Hall.

(St. John Telegraph.)

Seldom is such a scene witnessed at a public gathering as was enacted at the mammoth Salvation Army meeting in St. Andrew's rink last night when for an instant General William Booth, commandant of the Salvation Army forces throughout the world, and commissioner Eva Booth head of the army in Canada, stood locked in each other's embrace while 2,500 people watched in silence.

Then arose a mighty ovation as the realization came home that the incident was of more portent than a meeting between commander and aide, general and commissioner—it was father and daughter strained to each other's breast in exuberance of affection.

The incident occurred as the venerable founder of the army was telling the vast audience why he came to Canada. "I came," said he, "to congratulate my soldiers on the fight they have made. There is cause for congratulation especially when I have in this land such a brave devoted aide as my talented daughter."

At this the audience broke into wildly enthusiastic applause. Commissioner Eva Booth, who was sitting at her father's right, flushed at this well merited praise, her face lighted up and slowly she advanced to his side and grasped hands with him. Twice for a second only, then parental love and pride swept overpoweringly over all thought of place or circumstances and father and daughter stood clasped in each other's arms while the audience stamped the act with its unanimous approbation by prolonged applause.

General Booth delivered a masterly address on the life and work of the army. He spoke with vigor and with that natural rugged eloquence which has proved the magnet to draw to his meetings throngs which have taxed the capacity of the largest auditoriums.

At the meeting Premier Tweedie presided and among other prominent citizens on the platform were Mayor White, Judge Forbes, Ald. I. B. Robinson, Ald. Robert Maxwell, Ald. T. H. Bullock, John Bullock, Joseph Bullock, Rev. H. F. Waring, Rev. A. Lucas, Rev. H. H. Roach, Rev. Christopher Burnett, Rev. A. White, T. S. Simms, E. H. McAlpine and others, in addition to General Booth, Commissioner Eva Booth, Colonel Lawley, Colonel Jacobs, Major Pagmire and other army officials.

In the course of his remarks the general explained that his trip to Canada was to inspect the work, to see his soldiers upon the fight they had made. Canada can do with more religion. Since the opening of this campaign in St. John 100 people had been brought to the penitent form. He would like to see more brought out at this meeting. He would like to see the premier of the province at the penitent form, inducing others to seek salvation. The tidings that would ring around the world that the premier had come out in a new character; in the character of a soul saver bringing people to Christ, would, he felt sure, add greatly to that gentleman's already great popularity.

Off His Base.

The Sun's Fredericton despatch dealing with the new rifle range and Architect Weatherbee's visit is a badly mixed up affair, and it is difficult to tell what the writer of it is driving at. The despatch says: "It was discovered after the work had progressed pretty well that the target could not be seen from the firing points, as the plans had placed them beyond five hundred yards, and after the firing points were about done, work was stopped upon them and Major Weatherbee summoned from Ottawa." Taking his cue from the above very lucid statement, the writer of the same headlines very naturally concludes that the range is "A Bad One."

Paul Weatherbee, chief architect of the militia department, is in the city making his annual inspection of the military property. In company with Lieut.-Col. Wadmore, he visited the barracks and officers quarters this morning and this afternoon inspected the Park barracks. He will leave for Ottawa by this evening's train.
