

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT

An Association Launched with this Object in View.

CITIZENS DISPLAY ACTIVE INTEREST IN THE PROPOSALS.

Officers Selected for the Current Year.

A meeting for the organization of a local improvement society was held last evening in the city council chamber.

Mr. Henry Chestnut has been interesting himself in this worthy object, and it was as a result of his efforts that the meeting was held.

T. C. Allen was elected chairman and Havelock Coy secretary.

Mr. Chestnut said that the object of such an association as the one proposed was for the object of beautifying the city. He had had conversations with tourists who were very favorably impressed. This was naturally a beautiful spot and we should be proud of it, but he thought it necessary to have a society which would work improvements along certain lines. The object was not to antagonize the road master, or the chairman of the board of works, or the city council, but rather to work hand in hand with the powers that be. He mentioned the river front and Phoenix Square as places to which the society could direct some attention. Then there was the matter of street cleaning and the planting of trees. He submitted two plans drawn by Mr. Minne for street draining.

Mr. Babbitt thought Mr. Chestnut's move an excellent one, and that it would be too bad for his suggestions to be lost on account of not being properly organized.

He moved: That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable that an association be now formed to be called "The Local Improvement Association of Fredericton" whose object it shall be to undertake such means for the beautifying and otherwise improving the city as may seem desirable.

Further Resolved that the gentlemen who have already signed the memorial of the date of June, 1902, along with those who may hereafter sign be members of the association; and

Further Resolved that the officers be a president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer.

This was seconded and carried.

It was at Major Cropley's suggestion that the phrase "and other improvements" was incorporated in the resolution. He had in mind the bread and butter matters, such as encouraging manufacturing, freight rates, etc., but the trend of opinion seemed to be in favor of sticking to the idea of beautifying the city as these other matters were duties of a board of trade and other organizations.

The following permanent officers were elected: President, T. C. Allen; Vice-Pres., Henry Chestnut; Sec.-Treasurer, Havelock Coy.

Mr. Allen said he had made some enquiries as to how such societies as this were organized. He found that some states had a general act permitting bodies of ten or more citizens to become incorporated. Any funds would be disbursed by them. He thought this the proper course and perhaps such an act could be passed by our legislature.

Mr. Chestnut moved that the officers with three other officers form an executive. This was carried and Charles H. Thomas, J. J. Weddall and R. W. L. Tibbits were appointed the three extra members.

Mr. Phinney and Col. Loggie made a few suggestions, and the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the chair.

RELEASED FROM PRISON

Arthur Brunet Convicted of Election Frauds Secures His Freedom.

Montreal, Sept. 13.—Arthur Brunet nephew of Mr. Brunet, M. P., who was found guilty at the June term of the court of King's Bench for frauds in connection with the last St. James Division election, has been given his liberty.

He was sentenced to six months imprisonment and he has served about two and a half months.

Shortly after he was incarcerated a number of friends commenced a movement by which it was hoped to get him out. To an extent it became non-political, and many men on each side of politics helped in the effort. The matter was laid before the Department of Justice and after careful consideration Brunet has been given his liberty.
