FASTER TRAIN SERVICE.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—According to Mr. John M. Lyons, general passenger agent of the I. C. R., who was in the city yesterday, it is probable that the Intercolonial next season will put on an additional fast train daily between Montreal and Halifax. This train will probably leave Montreal in the evening and reach Halifax in 22 hours. At the last session of the Parliament the members from the Maritime Provinces strongly urged upon Mr. Blair that such a service was necessary and he promised to do something if the traffic was found to warrant it.

THE TRADE OF DAWSON.

Shows Remarkable Increase Over Last Year.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The customs returns from Dawson to the department at Ottawa just received, show that during the quarter ending September 30th, the revenue was \$227,144, compared with \$182,000 for the same quarter last year, or an increase of \$45,144.

The trade returns for September show importations via White Horse to the amount of \$1,146,201. Of this amount \$78,138 was Canadian or duty paid merchandise, while the imports from the United States amounted to \$260,000. This is taken to show that while the Yukon trade is growing, it is also devoted principally to the patronage of home industry.

RETIRES.

Winnipeg, Oct. 31.—It is reported that changes in the composition of the Manitoba Government are imminent. Hon. John A. Davidson, the Provincial Treasurer, is seriously ill at Neepawa, and it is understood that his medical advisers have notified him that he must immediately retire from active political life.

DANGEROUS TO THE PUBLIC.

Jury's Strong Presentment Against Christian Science.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Port Hope, Ont., Oct. 31.—The inquest into the cause of the death of Harold Leslie Long, a boy who died on Sunday from diphtheria, while receiving Christian Science treatment, was held last night and the jury brought in the following verdict:

"That Harold Leslie Long came to his death at the home of his parents, in the town of Port Hope, from diphtheria, on October 26, 1902, and find that the parents neglected to call in medical attendance until the child was practically at death's door. We also find Robert Hosery, Christian Science demonstrator, accessory to the child's death, inasmuch as he undertook to treat, for which he received a remuneration, a dangerous and contagious disease which he admitted he was totally ignorant of. The teaching of the sect known as Christian Scientists, as brought out in the evidence, is a danger to the public generally, and this jury would strongly urge that the Legislature enact a law which would make it a criminal offence for the demonstrator of this belief to attend or treat a case which is not being attended by a duly qualified medical practitioner."

COMING TO AMERICA.

Augusta, Me., Oct. 31.—George H. Harvey, a well-known citizen of Augusta, was out hunting for deer in the vicinity of this city yesterday, in company with his uncle, John W. Harvey, and William S. Butler, a neighbor and friend. They became separated in the swamps and later on Harvey was shot in the leg by Butler, being mistaken for a deer.

Statesman and Gambler.

Charles James Fox, the English statesman, was even more notorious in the gaming world than he was famous in the world of politics. He had squandered \$250,000 before coming of age. He became one of the most profligate gamblers of the vicious days in which he lived. Some of his finest displays in debate were sandwiched between excitement such as would unnerve most men who had no serious business on hand. Walpole has given a glimpse of a typical passage in this extraordinary man's life. He had to take part in the discussion on the thirty-nine articles in parliament on a certain Thursday. He had sat up playing hazard from Tuesday evening until 5 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. An hour before he had recovered \$60,000 that he had lost and by dinner time, which was 5 o'clock, ended losing \$55,000. On Thursday he spoke in the debate, went to dinner at past 11 at night; thence to a club, where he drank till 7 the next morning; thence to a gambling house, where he won \$30,000, and between 3 and 4 in the afternoon he set out on a journey to Newmarket.
