

MARRIAGE ANNULLED

Judge Gregory Unravels a Matrimonial Tangle at the Divorce Court.

JUDGMENT DELIVERED IN TURNER VS. TURNER.

In Favor of Mrs. Turner, the Plaintiff.

Judge Gregory delivered judgment at the divorce court this morning in the case of Mary Olivia Turner vs. Henry Turner, granting a decree annulling the marriage. This case was tried in February last, a decree being asked for by the wife on the ground that her husband was impotent and incapacitated from consummating the marriage. Mrs. Turner is at present a resident of Salisbury, Westmorland County, and Mr. Turner lives at St. John, being in the employ of the customs department at that place. The couple were married at Salisbury on March 15th, 1900, Rev. Joseph Pascall performing the ceremony. Afterwards they went to St. John and lived there together about six months. Mrs. Turner, it seems, was previously married and had five children by her first husband, two of whom are living. Upon leaving Turner at the end of six months she went to Boston to visit her son and did not return to her husband, though she exchanged letters with him.

In delivering judgment His Honor briefly reviewed the circumstances of the case, commenting on the fact that the respondent had refused to submit himself to a medical examination as ordered by the court, while the plaintiff had done so, and been reported favorably upon by the examiners. His Honor stated that as the respondent did not give testimony or attempt to show that the marriage was consummated, there was nothing for him to do but accept the statement of the plaintiff that the marriage had not been consummated, though he was not prepared to say that it was because of any malformation on the part of respondent. In the light of the evidence there was nothing for him to do but grant the decree of annulment to Mrs. Turner, and order the respondent to pay the costs of the suit.

Dr. A. A. Stockton, K. C., was proctor for the plaintiff in this case, and H. H. Pickett for the respondent.

His Honor announced that several points in the case of Hartley vs. Hartley, tried in July last, would require further consideration, consequently he would be unable to deliver judgment until the February term.
