

GLASS EYE CAUSED TROUBLE.

Complications Followed Owner's Neglect to Close it When Dozing.

New York, Dec. 12.—Daniel Y. Lewis of Jersey City, who is one of the Hudson Boulevard Commissioners, yesterday told of a ludicrous incident that happened at a farm he owns at Hillsdale, N. J. Mr. Lewis and family returned to their city home on Dec. 1, leaving the farm in the care of Peter Banta and his wife. On Tuesday Mr. William Kopf and Robert Burns were sent to Hillsdale with three horses owned by John McAnland. The horses were to be kept on the farm for the winter.

In giving Kopf and Burns directions for reaching the farm, he neglected to inform them that Banta has a glass eye. When Kopf and Burns reached the farm house Mrs. Banta was absent. Banta was asleep in a chair, his head resting on a table. His glass eye was wide open, and naturally had a "glassy" stare. Kopf spoke to Banta, but received no reply. Kopf concluded that Banta had been stricken by apoplexy, and was unconscious and dying, and sent Burns hurrying to the village for a doctor.

Before the physician arrived Banta awoke. Mistaking Kopf for a thief, he seized a shotgun and drove him from the house. When Burns and the doctor arrived Banta had cooled down, but he refused to pay the doctor for his visit, and Burns was obliged to settle the bill. Kopf ran all the way to the railway station and boarded a train that was just leaving. Then he discovered that Burns had their return tickets. As he had no money he was put off the train at Etna. From there he was compelled to walk to Jersey City, a distance of fifteen miles.

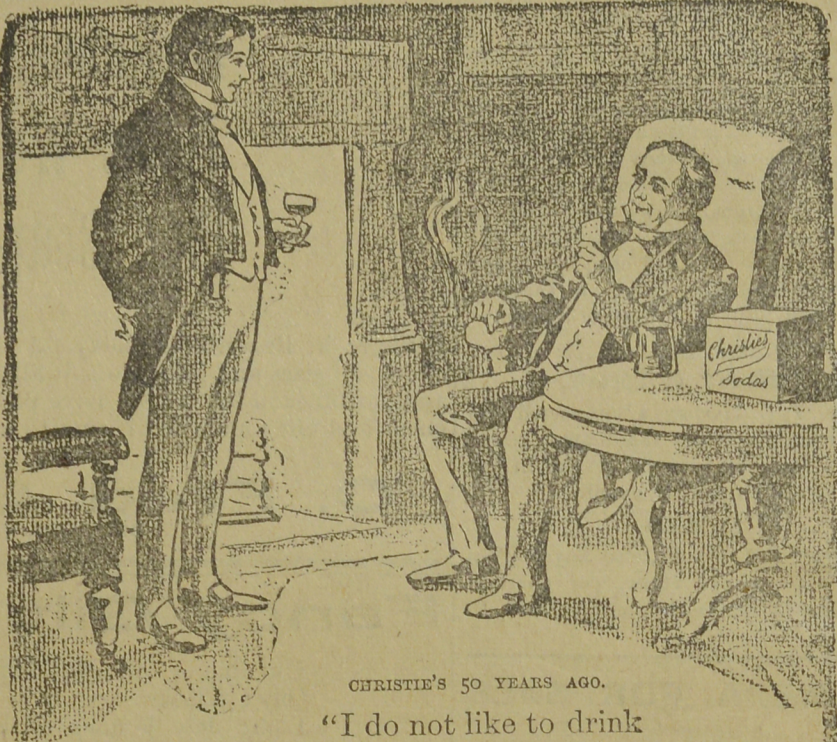

CANADIAN SENATOR

Who Told Americans Some Wholesome Truth.

Detroit, Dec. 13.—An element of discord was injected into yesterday's proceedings by the address made by Senator McMullen of Mount Forest, Ontario, at the banquet given in honor of the delegates. The speaker declared with great positiveness that there was one question that must be settled before reciprocity between the United States and Canada is possible, and that was the Alaska boundary dispute.

Senator McMullen said that no one must get the idea that Canada is seeking reciprocity. "It is a wrong impression," he said. "Years ago before the Dingley law was passed Canada was anxious for reciprocity with the United States. As a reason for prosecution of that law, Canada went to work vigorously to secure an outlet for the products that she had been sending to the United States, but which the Dingley law barred out. And we have been able to secure an outlet and one that is quite satisfactory. We, in Canada, ever felt the spirit of independence. We feel it today.

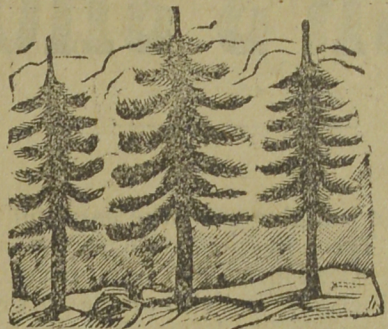
Seasonable.
