

ON TENTED FIELD.

Maritime Province Soldiers Drilling at Camp Sussex.

LORD DUNDONALD ADDRESSED OFFICERS AND MEN ON THEIR DUTY.

A Good Word for Capt. Massie 71st Regiment Quartermaster.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Camp Sussex, Sept. 10.—All the troops to undergo instruction here have arrived, making a total of about fifteen hundred under canvas.

The corps represented are the Eighth Hussars, 67th, 71st, 73rd and 74th Regts. of New Brunswick, 82nd of Prince Edward Island and 68th, 69th, 75th, 78th, 93rd and 94th of Nova Scotia, detachment from the army medical corps and R. C. R.

The details from three Nova Scotia regiments, who crossed the bay in the Prince Rupert, reached camp about midnight, being delayed three hours at St. John.

The 94th Highlanders from Cape Breton were the last to arrive.

Lord Dundonald arrived last evening, and addressed the troops on parade this morning, explaining that the object of the camp was to familiarize officers and non-coms. with the new drill, and instruct them in field exercises.

The officers and non-coms. of the New Brunswick brigade paraded in separate bodies and listened to lectures by Capt. Simmons and Uniacke on shelter trench work. All were afterwards armed with picks and shovels, but before they had opportunity to use them rain began to descend and the parade was dismissed.

There is going to be lots of practical work at this camp and all ranks must learn to use pick, shovel and rifle.

The seventy-first contingent reached camp at four o'clock yesterday and were delighted to find that Quartermaster Massie had everything in readiness for them. He is certainly the most wide awake quartermaster on the grounds.

THE EXHIBITION OF 1883.

Recalled by Recent Boasts that that of 1902 Excelled All Predecessors.

St. John is at present jubilant over the success of its exhibition and the trend of newspaper comment seems to be that it was the most successful ever held in this province. It did indeed remarkably well if it beat the Dominion and Centennial exhibition of 1883 of which John H. Reid of this city was one of the commissioners under which board of management the show was held. The Centennial lasted four days, for which 67,356 adult tickets, 1,631 children's and 1,148 season tickets were sold. The grant from the Dominion and Provincial governments and the city of St. John totalled \$23,800 and the receipts from the exhibition proper were \$18,757.86. The result showed a balance of \$3,243.40 on the right side. While the grants were large, yet the expenditure on buildings, etc., of a permanent nature, about equalled that amount.

For the centennial each exhibitor paid \$1.00, which was an entry fee for whatever he exhibited and at the same time admitted himself and attendants. For the shows of recent years each exhibitor and attendants ticket costs \$1.00 and an entrance fee of \$1.00 or less was charged for each exhibit.

OUR BOYS THE VICTORS.

Fredericton Knights of Pythias Won the Fowler Cup at Truro.

Truro, N. S., Sept. 10.—The Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias of the maritime provinces is in session here with about 300 members in attendance.

Yesterday afternoon a very fine parade through the principal streets was made by the Uniform Rank K. of P., composed of four regiments, one each from St. John, Fredericton, St. Stephen, and Moncton. Without doubt this parade, for the soldierly bearing and the general fine appearance of the men in their handsome uniforms, was far ahead of anything seen in Truro for a long time.

After the walk through town, they marched to the park, where a drill competition was held between the St. Stephen division "Frontier," Capt. Grimmer, No. 4, and Fredericton division, "Fowler," No. 6, Capt. W. H. Gray. The Fredericton division came off the victors, thus winning the Fowler cup. The judges were Colonel Blair, Capt. H. C. Blair and E. M. Fulton, president of the board of trade.

The session of the grand lodge will close this evening.

WANTED THE EARTH

Preposterous Demands of Boer Generals

TO WHICH CHAMBERLAIN MADE ABSOLUTE REFUSAL.

Told Them They Were Already Better Treated Than the Southern States.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

London, Sept. 10.—A parliamentary paper issued today, gives a detailed report of the demands made upon Chamberlain, by the Boer generals at the recent conference.

It is an astonishing list, the most important being complete amnesty to rebels, a yearly grant to Boer widows and orphans and maimed brothers, immediate relatives and all prisoners of war, and reinstatement of officials of state in the South African republics or compensation for loss of office.

Mr. Chamberlain expressed great surprise at the demands, which he did not grant. He pointed out that the Boers were better treated than the Northern States treated the South, and that was a war between people of the same blood.

Mr. Chamberlain added that settled government would come to South Africa as soon as old animosities had died out.

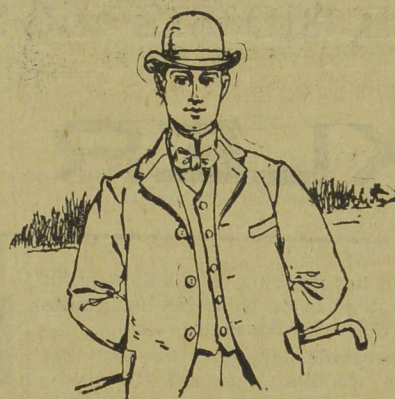
