Lieutenant Governor of
New Brunswick.

INTERESTING CEREMONY AT THE PARLIAMENT BUILDING.

The Oath Administered by Chief
Justice Tuck

IN THE PRESENCE OF A LARGE GATHERING OF PEOPLE.

Hon. J. B. Snowball, lieutenant governor of New Brunswick accompanied by his secretary, Fred M. Eddy, arrived from Chatham by the Canada Eastern Express at 1.30 o'clock. He was met at the depot by R. S. Barker, and Capt. J. J. F. Winslow private secretary and A. D. C. respectively to the late lieutenant governor, and boarding a barouche sleigh the party were driven to the Queen Hotel, where His Honor will make his head quarters. Alex Gibson M. P. boarded the train at Marysville, and accompanied His Honor to the city.

His Honor was formally sworn into office at the Assembly Chamber of the Parliament building at three o'clock this afternoon in the presence of a large and representative gathering. The galleries were thronged to their utmost capacity, and many prominent citizens, including members of the legislature, city council and clergymen, occupied seats on the floor of the House.

A large bouquet of roses and carnations, occupied the stands on either side of the speaker's chair, and another adorned the member's committee desk.

Shortly after three the door beneath the ladies' gallery opened, and the governor elect accompanied by his secretary, F. M. Eddy, and John J. McGee, clerk of the Privy Council of Canada, Chief Justice Tuck, R. W. L. Tibbitts, Hon. A. R. McClellan the retiring Lieutenant Governor, R. S. Barker, the latter's private secretary and his A. D. C., Capt. J. J. F. Winslow entered the chamber.

The party halted in front of the speaker's dias where they were met by Premier Tweedie, Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Hon. A. T. Dunn, Hon. L. P. Farris, Hon. G. F. Hill and Clerk Rainsford and Clerk Assistant Dibblee.

Mr. McGee opened the proceedings by reading the proclamation appointing the new Governor to office, and afterwards handed His Honor the commission. The document was immediately passed over to R. W. L. Tibbitts, who proceeded to read it to the assemblage. When he had concluded Chief Justice Tuck stepped forward and administered the oath, after which His Honor signed the roll.

The Clerk presented the new governor with the seals of office, which His Honor in turn committed to Provincial Secretary Tweedie for safe keeping.

The chief justice was the first to extend congratulations to His Honor after the ceremony, and his example was followed by the members of the government and other gentlemen present.

filtration was a thing that could be dealt with at a later date.

Ald. Farrell then moved, seconded by Ald. Everett, that a plebiscite vote on the question of sewerage be taken on the same date as the civic elections and under the same conditions as last year.

Ald. Vanwart was in favor of having the vote taken separately from the aldermanic elections. To his mind there was no evidence that the public wanted sewerage. If they wanted it they should say so at a public meeting. If the plebiscite were held on the same date as the elections the people were apt to lose sight of the question.

Ald. McNally again spoke in favor of

having the vote taken on a different date than the elections. He thought the council should set apart a day, and with the assistance of the press inaugurate an educational campaign on the subject.

Ald. Everett believed that the council would be justified in holding the plebiscite on election day. If Ald. Vanwart was afraid of losing his seat over the question, he was welcome to his (Everett's). He did not agree with Ald. McNally that there was no agitation in favor of sewerage. The two daily papers were in favor of it, and numerous influential ratepayers had spoken to him on the subject.

Ald. Farrell was greatly surprised at the attitude taken by Ald. McNally on the subject. Ald. McNally had promised to carry into effect some great improvements in the interests of the people. What had happened to him now that he had a chance to do something. The local press had advocated sewerage and he had not noticed a single communication in the press in opposition to the question. Numerous citizens had asked him to give them a chance to vote on the subject and he thought it no more than right that their demands should be met. He would say right now that he (Farrell) was to be in the field at the approaching election and he was going to be in the field to win.

Ald. McNally defended his course as an alderman and claimed that he had not relaxed his efforts in the interests of reform. He was not opposed to a plebiscite but favored holding it on a separate day.

He moved in amendment that the plebiscite be held on a separate day.

Ald. Farrell's motion was then put to the meeting and carried on the following division:

Yeas—Alds. Farrell, Everett, Clark, Merrithew and Ryan.

Nays—Ald. Vanwart, Slipp and McNally.

On motion of Ald. Merrithew the council adjourned sine die.

The Springbok.

A peculiarity of that most beautiful of South African antelopes the springbok is that it always leaps over human tracks. It is at once exceedingly shy and marvelously active, and the reason for this strange antic is its intense suspicion of any possible enemies, among whom it has come to recognize man as the most dangerous.

It is not only with human tracks that the springbok goes through this performance, for it does the same with the tracks of lions or even when it gets wind of a lion. The leap is exceedingly graceful, and the animal covers from twelve to fifteen feet at each bound. It drops on all four feet at once and immediately rises again, making a clear spring without any run.

Its usual gait when not pursued is a light springy trot. The springbok usually travels with its nose to the ground, as if constantly on the lookout for the scent of enemies.

Pueblos and the Compass.

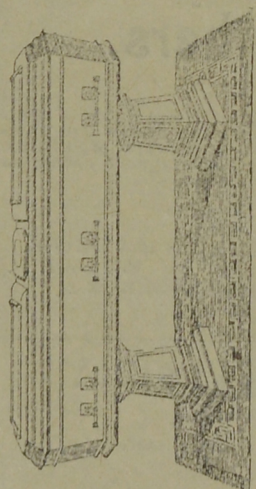
Among the Pueblo Indians six points of the compass are recognized, and each has its color. North is yellow, west is blue, south is red, east is white, the upper regions are many colored and the lower regions are black. All the prey gods are represented by their images in these six divisions.

For example, there is the yellow mountain lion of the north, the blue mountain lion of the west, the red mountain of the south, and so on. Likewise it is with the other beasts, and thus a very considerable number of deities is formed. All of them must receive worshipful attention lest they get angry and revenge themselves for the neglect.
