Curling Notes.

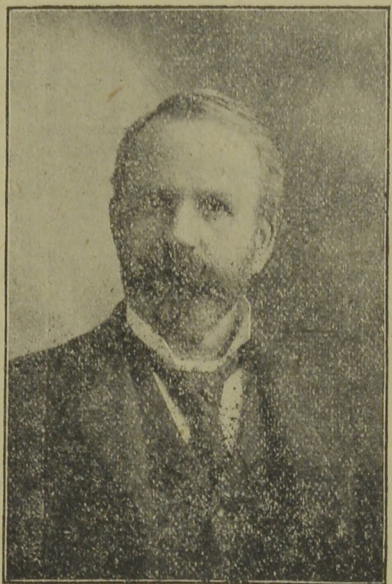

MR. KILBURN'S DEATH.

The End Came at Five O'clock Tuesday Afternoon.

Benjamin Kilburn, an aged and highly respected citizen, who met with an accident on Saturday and suffered a stroke of paralysis in consequence, passed away at his home on Brunswick street at five o'clock last evening. He had suffered a great deal during his short illness and his death was not unexpected.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Kingsclear, and resided there up to four years ago when he removed to the city and has since made his home here.



HON. FREDERICK P. THOMPSON,
Senator of Canada.

Born at Nashwaakiss, York Co., 1846, son of the late Alex Thompson ex-M. P. P., educated there, and at Mount Allison Academy, engaged in business as foundryman in Fredericton—firm of McFarlane, Thompson & Anderson, with which he is still connected. Elected to represent the parish of Douglas in York municipal council when twenty-two years old, afterwards elected warden of York, serving for three years, elected to the House of Assembly in 1878, reelected in 1882, appointed to the legislative council 1885, resigned in 1891 to run as a Liberal candidate in York for the House of Commons, defeated, unsuccessful candidate for the House of Assembly 1895, re-elected to that body 1899, is managing director of New Brunswick Telephone Co., vice-president of Victoria Hospital board, married Sept. 1876 to Eliza, daughter of the late Rev. John Snowball, and sister of Governor Snowball. A Liberal and a Methodist.

When a young man he engaged in lumbering, and followed that vocation for nearly forty years operating at different times on the Upper St. John, Tobique and Nackawick Rivers.

Mr. Kilburn was twice married but had been a widower for a number of years. By his first wife, he leaves one son, John Kilburn, the well known lumber operator of this city, and Mrs. O. M. Hartt of this city, is a daughter by his second wife, Julius Kilburn, of Macnaquac, is a brother, and Mrs. Benjamin Cliff, of Prince William, and Mrs. E. S. Hammond, of Kingsclear, are sisters of the deceased. Mr. Kilburn was in his 85th year. He was a gentleman of a most kindly and genial disposition and was universally esteemed by his acquaintances.

The funeral will take place from the residence of John Kilburn, Brunswick street, at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Service will be conducted by Rev Dr. Chapman and interment will be made in the rural cemetery. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
