HONORED THE MEMORY OF THEIR PATRON SAINT FAR INTO THE MORNING.

A Record Breaking Attendance—Many Eloquent Addresses—Premier Tweedie the Guest of Honor.



The members of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew should feel proud of the success which attended their annual supper and reunion at the Barker House last evening. In point of attendance it was certainly the most successful celebration the society has held during the seventy-seven years of its existence, and it was a success in all other respects. It was a genuine Scotchmen's night, and the members of the society and their friends entered heartily into the spirit of the occasion. The supper was first class, the speeches which followed were eloquent and well conceived, and the musical part of the program was all that could be desired.

The veteran piper, Daniel Hossack of Stanley, was on hand bright and early, and the strains of his bagpipes, which he knows how to manipulate to perfection, reverberated through the hotel and made the guests feel thoroughly at home at the onset.

Covers were laid for 125 persons, and there was not a vacant place at the table, indeed it taxed the energies of Vice President Edwards and other officers of the society to their utmost to get the crowd settled down to business, but they finally accomplished the task.

The tables which were arranged in the form of a magnet, were artistically decorated for the occasion, and presented a most inviting appearance.

O. S. Crockett, president of the society, was in the chair, having Premier Tweedie and Lieut. Col. White, D. O. C., on his left and Judge Gregory and Dr. Thomas Harrison on his right. The vice chairs were filled respectively by John A. Edwards and Frank L. Cooper, vice presidents of the society. The menu card, which was gotten up especially for the occasion, was a splendid specimen of the printer's art. It was printed in pamphlet form, the title page having embossed thereon the Scottish shield and the words "Should Auld Acquaintance be Forgot, 1825, 1902," and on the reverse side was shown the Scottish thistle executed in crimson and gold.

An eight course dinner was served by an efficient staff of waiters and came in for ample justice from the company. During an intermission the Haggis was brought in, preceded by the pipes, and was accorded all the honors which a Scotchman believes is due so rare a dish. Winter's orchestra from a position in the main hall rendered a program of Scottish airs during the progress of the dinner, which was greatly enjoyed.

After the hot punch had been brought on and placed under the care of officers of the society, Secretary McFarlane arose in his place and read fraternal greetings which had been exchanged with sister societies at St. John, Halifax, Campbellton, Quebec, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, Philadelphia, Rossland, B. C., Winnipeg, and Stanley.

He also read letters from Governor Snowball, Dean Partridge, Senator Thompson, W. T. Whitehead, M. P. P., J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., R. D. Wilmot, M. P., James Pringle, and Richard Sullivan,

expressing regret at their inability to be present.

The Toasts and Speeches

After the glasses had been duly charged President Crockett proposed the health of His Majesty the King, which was responded to with the singing of the national anthem. A toast to Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, was also proposed by the president and duly honored.

Vice Chairman Edwards in a brief but eloquent speech proposed the health of the governor general, which was received with musical honors.

In response to loud calls William Minto, sr., a jolly old son of Scotland, rendered in his inimical style a Scotch song which was greeted with tumultuous applause.

In proposing the health of the lieutenant governor President Crockett referred to the intimate and friendly relations, which the society had enjoyed with occupants of that high office from the time of Sir Howard Douglas down to the present day. He was not altogether in sympathy with the present advisers of His Honor, but thought he and the country could stand them for another month or so.

Premier Tweedie, who was very heartily received, returned thanks for the toast on behalf of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. In regard to the qualifications of Governor Snowball, they were all right—he came from Chatham. He was glad that the chairman had given him (Tweedie) an extension of a month longer to hold office; after what had been said, it was like the renewal of a note and he felt grateful for it. In regard to the duties of lieutenant governor, they were very arduous, if the governor was allowed to tell it himself. He could assure the president that if the governor continued to act on the advice given by his present advisers, the province need have no fear of results. (Applause and laughter.)

President Crockett, after an interesting and appropriate address, proposed "The Day and a' Wha Honor It." He spoke of the great influence which Scotchmen had exercised in the affairs of the world, in religion, commerce, statescraft and war. With such a glorious record was it any wonder that patriotism was the watchword of the Scotchman and that they were proud of the "land of the heather?"

The toast was drunk with great enthusiasm and three hearty cheers, proposed by Mr. Minto, were very lustily given.

This toast was followed by a Scotch song, rendered by Frank L. Cooper, which elicited hearty and well deserved applause.

The health of our Parliaments was proposed by His Honor Judge Gregory in an able speech. He was inclined to think that the toast referred more particularly to our local parliaments, with which we are in closer touch than any other. Scotchmen, the world over, like to take a hand in forming parliaments, and that he thought was but natural. He referred humorously to the absence of Mr. Hazen and presence of Mr. Tweedie, and remarked that it was possible that the former might have heard some news of a political nature which had kept him away. Premier Tweedie had some information locked up in his breast in regard to the date of the elections, which no doubt all would like to hear, but he hardly thought they would get it. As regards himself he was in a position now to command the confidence

of both parties. As he said before, Scotchmen were usually engaged in making governments. Since confederation New Brunswick had had a Scotchman at the head of affairs almost continuously. First there was Mr. Fraser, then Mr. Blair, and next the late Mr. Mitchell. In Dominion politics we have had Sir John MacDonald, Mr. McKenzie, and then Sir John MacDonald again. Although at the present time we have for a premier a gentleman of French extraction, he thought that the Scotchman's turn would come next. The fact that this toast had been placed on the list was pretty good proof that the society was satisfied with both governments, and he felt that the same might be said of the country.

ASKS DAMAGES FOR A KISS

Reading, Pa., Nov. 29.—An alleged attempt to kiss a girl at Frush Valley, this county, last June, resulted in the trial of a suit for \$5,000 damages for internal injuries in Judge Ermentout's court. Miss Jennie Keller, nineteen years old, is the plaintiff and Henry Borrell, one of the Alsace supervisors, a widower of sixty years, is the defendant. They are neighbors.

Miss Keller testified at the trial as follows:

"On the evening of June 12, I was at a friend's home, when Mr. Borrell caught hold of me demanding that I should give him a kiss. I became frightened and tried to run away. I fell from the porch on the top of a pole fence and from that to the ground unconscious. I was unconscious for more than a day.
